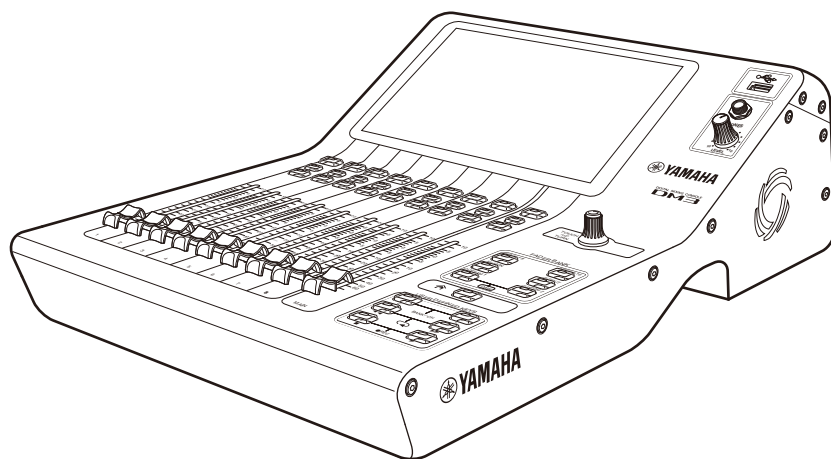

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# Introduction

## About the Product

### Differences with DM3

DM3 is compatible with the Dante audio network. DM3 STANDARD can only be used as a standalone product.

### NOTE

Unless illustrated otherwise, use those of the DM3.

### Target User

This product is geared toward people accustomed to mixing the audio of PA systems, such as in hall or for events.

### Purpose

This product is used for mixing multiple sources of sound, such as live performances of bands, corporate events or producing music.

## Notation

- In this DM3 Series reference manual, the switches on the panel are called “keys.” The control knobs on the panel are all called “knobs.” Knobs may turn from a minimum to a maximum value, or turn endlessly.
- The virtual buttons displayed on the display are called “buttons” and the knobs are called “knobs.” Controls on the panel are written inside brackets [ ] to distinguish them from virtual buttons and knobs displayed onscreen. (Example: [CUE] key) The section name may be written in front of the brackets for some controls. (Example: USER DEFINED KEYS [A] key)

### ■ DM3 Editor

This software allows you to make settings for and operate the console from your computer. Operations like backing up unit settings and setting up a console without it present may also be done.

### ■ DM3 StageMix

This iPad application is for wirelessly controlling the DM3 Series system. A mixing engineer can operate parameters directly from a location separated from the system, such as the position of a performer on-stage.

### ■ MonitorMix

This software is for smart devices to wirelessly control MIX sends of the DM3 series.

### ■ Yamaha Steinberg USB Driver

This is driver software for connecting a computer to the DM3 Series. It controls a maximum of 18IN/18OUT audio signals with the DAW software or remotely controls the DAW software.

### ■ ProVisionaire Control

This Windows software allows the user to create a control panel that matches the installation environment and operating methods and to control the device remotely.

### ■ ProVisionaire Touch

This iPad application allows the user to create a control panel that matches the installation environment and operating methods and to control the device remotely.

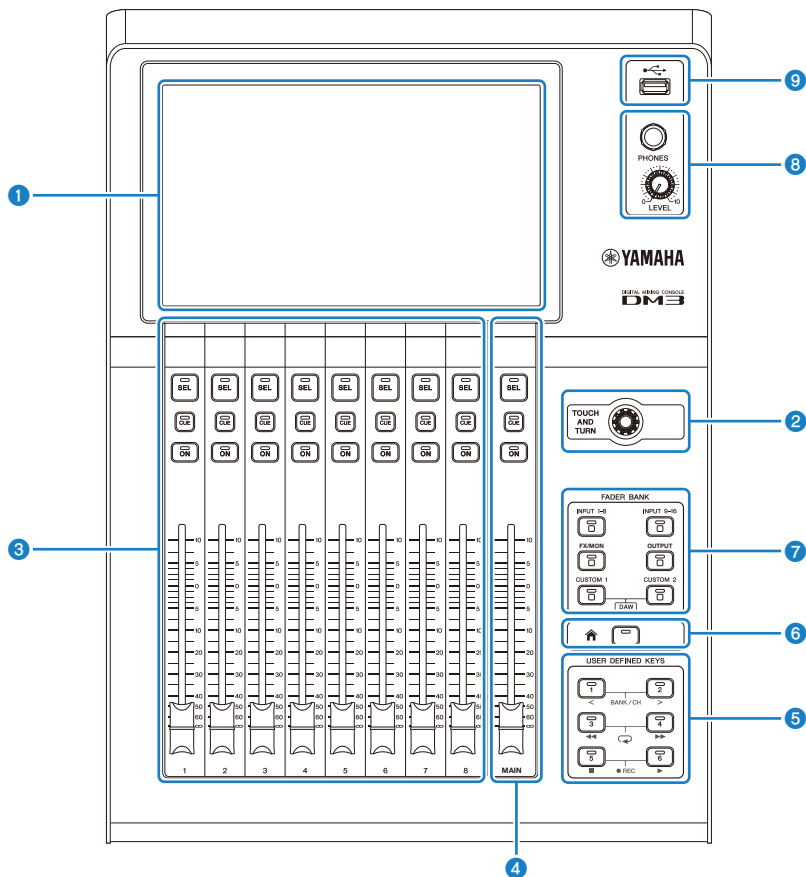


# Controls and functions

## Top panel

### Overview of the top panel

Following is an explanation of the functions and names of parts of the top panel of the DM3 Series.



**1 Display**

The display can be operated by touching it. (p.19)

**2 [TOUCH AND TURN] Knob**

Use when adjusting the selected parameter. (p.19)

**3 CHANNEL STRIP section**

This part corresponds to the channel module of a conventional analog mixer. It is for operating the main parameters of the currently selected channel. (p.20)

**4 [MAIN] section**

This section is primarily for operating the STEREO channel. (p.21)

**5 [USER DEFINED KEYS] section**

Keys that operate functions assigned at the discretion of the user. A number of frequently used functions, such as tap tempo, bookmarks, etc., are assigned by default. (p.23)

**6 [HOME] key**

Returns to the HOME screen. (p.24)

**7 [FADER BANK] section**

Switches the faders assigned to the panel. (p.22)

**8 [PHONES] section**

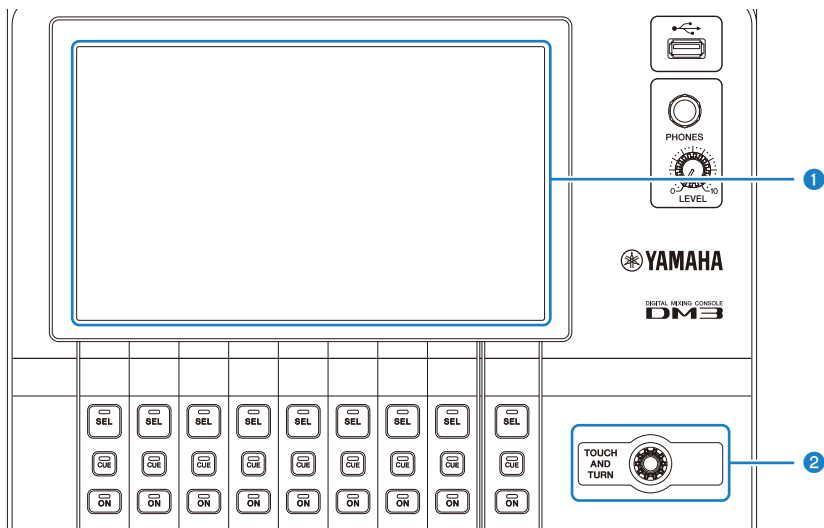
For monitoring the signal selected with MONITOR select, or the CUE signal via headphones. (p.25)

**9 USB connector**

This connector is for connecting a USB storage device. (p.26)

## Display and [TOUCH AND TURN] knob

The display can be operated by touching it. Using the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob allows intuitive operation of parameters.



### 1 Display

In addition to touch/double-touching it, the display can be operated by sliding, swiping and pinching in/out on it.

### 2 [TOUCH AND TURN] Knob

Operates the parameter selected on the display.

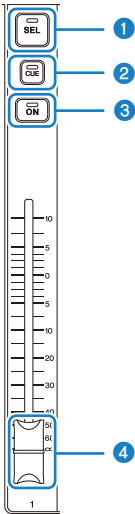

## CHANNEL STRIP section

---

The CHANNEL STRIP section corresponds to the channel module of a conventional analog mixer and it operates the main parameters of the selected channel. The channels assigned on the CUSTOM FADER BANK screen can be customized.



### 1 [SEL] key

This key selects the channel to be operated. Pressing this key makes it light and that channel is selected on the display as being subject to operation. With stereo channels, each press of the [SEL] key toggles between the L/R channels.

### 2 [CUE] key

The [CUE] key selects the channel to monitor. It lights when the CUE is ON.

### 3 [ON] key

Toggles the channel ON/OFF. This key lights for channels that are ON. In the SENDS ON FADER mode, the signal sent from that channel to the currently selected MIX BUS, FX BUS, or MATRIX BUS is toggled ON/OFF.

### 4 Fader

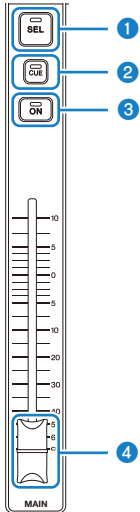
Faders adjust the signal level of the channel. In the SENDS ON FADER mode, it adjusts the send level from that channel to the currently selected MIX BUS, FX BUS, or MATRIX BUS .

## [MAIN] section

---

The [MAIN] section is primarily for operating the parameters of the STEREO channel. The channels assigned on the CUSTOM FADER BANK screen can be customized.

When using the normal FADER BANK, or a CUSTOM FADER BANK with MAIN assigned to it, it operates SEND MAIN in the SENDS ON FADER mode.



- 1 [SEL] key**

This key selects the STEREO channel to be operated. Each press of the [SEL] key toggles which of the L/R channels are to be operated.
- 2 [CUE] key**

The [CUE] key is for selecting the STEREO channel to monitor. The LED lights when CUE is ON.
- 3 [ON] key**

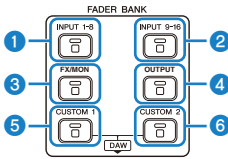
Toggles the STEREO channel ON/OFF. This key lights when ON. To operate as SEND MAIN, toggle the send destination bus ON/OFF in the SENDS ON FADER mode.
- 4 Fader**

This adjusts the output level of the STEREO channel. To operate as SEND MAIN, adjust the send level to the send to bus in the SENDS ON FADER mode.

## [FADER BANK] section

---

The [FADER BANK] section switches the faders assigned to the panel. Selected keys light.



**1 [INPUT 1-8] keys**

Channel INPUT keys 1-8 are displayed in the CHANNEL STRIP section.

**2 [INPUT 9-16] keys**

Channel INPUT keys 9-16 are displayed in the CHANNEL STRIP section.

**3 [FX/MON] key**

ST IN, FX RTN 1-2, FX 1-2, MONITOR and STEREO are displayed in the CHANNEL STRIP section.

**4 [OUTPUT] key**

MIX 1-6 and MATRIX 1-2 are displayed in the CHANNEL STRIP section.

**5 [CUSTOM 1] key**

**6 [CUSTOM 2] key**

CUSTOM FADER BANK is displayed in the CHANNEL STRIP section and the [MAIN] section.

If [CUSTOM 1] key and [CUSTOM 2] key are pressed at the same time, the fader assigned on the panel switches to DAW REMOTE BANK and the DAW REMOTE screen displayed. The DAW software can be controlled remotely using the CHANNEL STRIP section or [USER DEFINED KEYS].

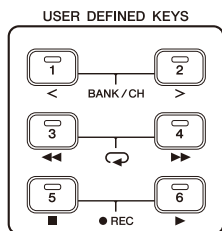

## [USER DEFINED KEYS] section

---

Keys that operate functions assigned at the discretion of the user.

Frequently used functions, such as tap tempo, bookmarks, etc., are assigned by default.



### NOTE

- When DAW REMOTE BANK is selected in the [FADER BANK] section, the function of DAW REMOTE BANK is a fixed assigned.
- To select DAW REMOTE BANK, press keys [CUSTOM 1] and [CUSTOM 2] in the [FADER BANK] section.

## [HOME] key

---

Press [HOME] key to return the display to the top HOME screen.



Pressing the [HOME] key while on the HOME screen switches the display to whatever has been configured with Key Function on the PREFERENCE screen.

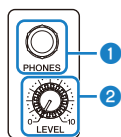

## [PHONES] section

---

Either the signal selected with MONITOR select or the CUE signal can be monitored with headphones.



**1 [PHONES] jacks**

Jack for inserting the headphone plug.

**2 [LEVEL] knob**

This knob adjusts the signal level output from the [PHONES] jack.

## USB connector

The USB connector is for connecting a USB storage device.



In addition to saving or importing data in a DM3 file, it can be used to play audio files saved on a USB storage device or record the mixer output to an audio file.

### NOTE

- The supported formats are FAT32/exFAT.
- The ACCESS indicator is displayed on the screen while accessing the device for saving, loading, deleting, etc. While displayed, refrain from removing the USB storage device or turning off the power of the console. Doing so may damage the USB storage device and/or damage the data on the console or on the USB storage device.
- Some USB storage devices can be write-protected to prevent accidentally erasing data. If important data is on the device, use its write-protect function to prevent overwriting data. Conversely, to save data, first make sure the write-protect function of the USB storage device is unlocked.
- Prior to removing the USB storage device, touch the remove USB storage device button on the tool bar. Remove the USB storage device after the message indicating it is safe to do so is displayed.

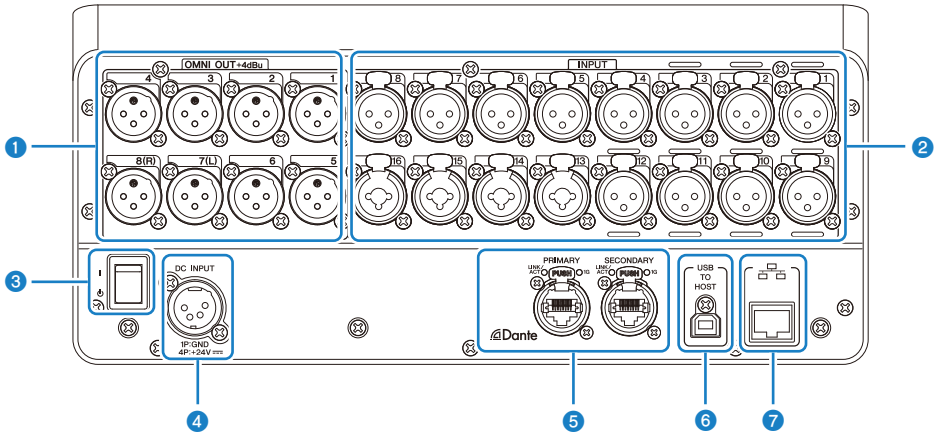

## Rear panel

Following is an explanation of the functions and names of parts of the rear panel of the DM3 Series.



### 1 [OMNI OUT] jacks

XLR-3-32 type output jacks for outputting analog audio signals. These jacks are primarily for outputting MIX channels and STEREO channels.

### 2 [INPUT] jacks

Connects to devices like mikes and musical instruments.

- **1 - 12:**  
XLR-3-31 input jacks
- **13 - 16:**  
Combo jacks compatible with both XLR and TRS phone plugs.

### 3 Power switch

When the switch is on ( | ), the power turns ON.

When the switch is on ( ⏻ ), the power goes to standby.

#### NOTICE

- If 10 seconds elapse since the last operation, the power switch goes to standby. The state just before the power switch went to standby is saved, and the system recovers to it when power comes back on.
- To turn the power back on from standby, wait about 6 seconds or so. Turning the power ON and OFF repeatedly may cause a malfunction.

**4 [DC INPUT] connector**

For connecting to the included power adapter. First connect this device to the power adapter and then plug it into the electrical outlet.



**WARNING**

- Only ever use the included power cord. Also, never use any other product with the included power cord. Damage, overheating, and/or fire may result. The included power cord is designed specifically for Japan (up to 125 V).



**CAUTION**

- Always put the console in standby prior to connecting or disconnecting the cord.
- A small amount of electricity flows even when the power is OFF (on standby). When the product will not be used for a long time, unplug the cord from the outlet.

**5 Dante PRIMARY/SECONDARY connectors (DM3 only)**

These connectors are for Dante audio network connections, such as I/O devices like the Tio1608-D. The connectors to use are RJ-45 connectors that conform to etherCON CAT5e, made by Neutrik.

**NOTICE**

- To prevent electromagnetic interference, use STP (Shielded Twisted Pair) cables. When using STP cables, make sure the metal parts of connectors and shielded parts of cables are in contact with conductive tape or the like.

**NOTE**

Do not use the EEE function (\*) of a network switch inside a Dante network. Power consumption settings are adjusted automatically between switches that support the EEE function, but some switches do not correctly adjust these mutual settings correctly. This means that in certain unfavorable cases with the Dante network, the EEE function of a switch might be enabled, impairing the clock synchronization capability and causing audio to be interrupted. As such, please note the following.

- If using a managed switch, turn off the EEE function of all ports that use Dante. Do not use a switch that does not allow you to turn off the EEE function.
- If using an unmanaged switch, do not use a switch that supports the EEE function. Such switches cannot turn off the EEE function.

\*EEE (Energy Efficient Ethernet) function: A technology that reduces power consumption of an Ethernet device when network traffic is sparse. It is also called "green Ethernet" or IEEE802.3az.

**6 [USB TO HOST] connector**

USB Type B Connector

The product functions as an up to 18 IN/18 OUT, 96 kHz/32-bit audio interface by connecting to a computer via USB cables. It also allows control of DM3 series and remote control of DAW software by USB-MIDI.

It is necessary to install Yamaha Steinberg USB Driver in order to communicate with a computer.

**NOTICE**

- Use USB cables under 3 m long.
- Wait at least 6 seconds between unplugging and replugging USB cables.

**7 Network Connector**

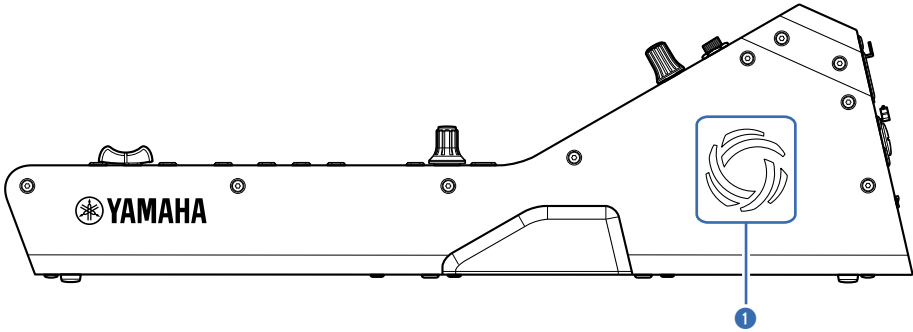
This is an RJ-45 connector for connecting to a computer. Use an ethernet cable (CAT5e or better recommended).

**NOTICE**

- To prevent electromagnetic interference, use STP (Shielded Twisted Pair) cables.

## Side panel

The functions and names of parts of the side panel of a DM3 series are explained here.



### 1 Vent holes

The product is equipped with a cooling fan to prevent the inside from getting too hot. When it gets too hot inside, the fan starts automatically. Both sides have vent holes.



### CAUTION

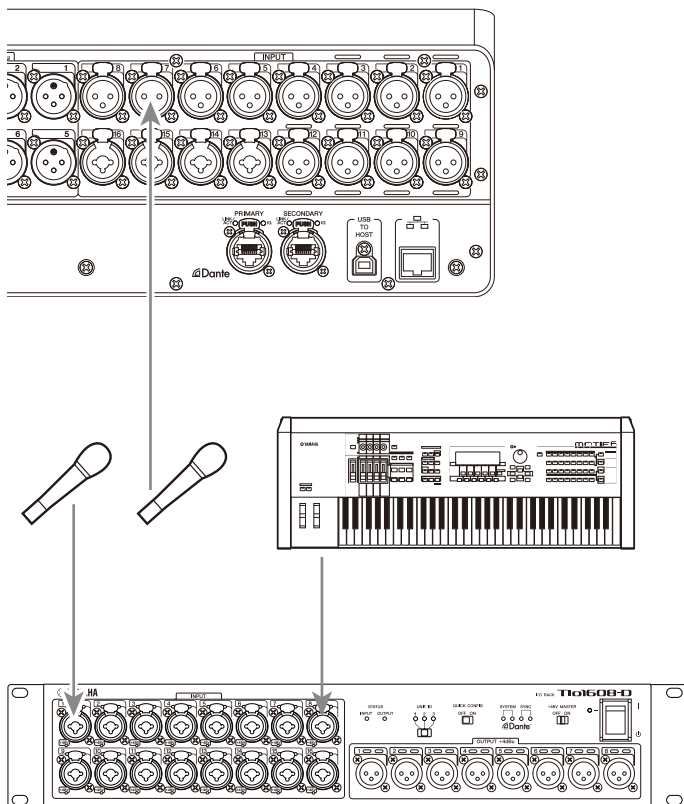
Avoid blocking the vent holes of the product (heat dissipation slits). If vent holes are covered, it may get too hot inside, resulting in damage and/or fire.

# Connections

## Analog connections

### Analog input connections

The INPUT jacks of I/O devices like the DM3 series are mainly for connecting mikes and line level equipment.



Tio1608-D

Switching of patches is configured on the SETUP screen → PATCH screen. Patch switching can also be made from INPUT screen → INPUT CH PATCH screen.

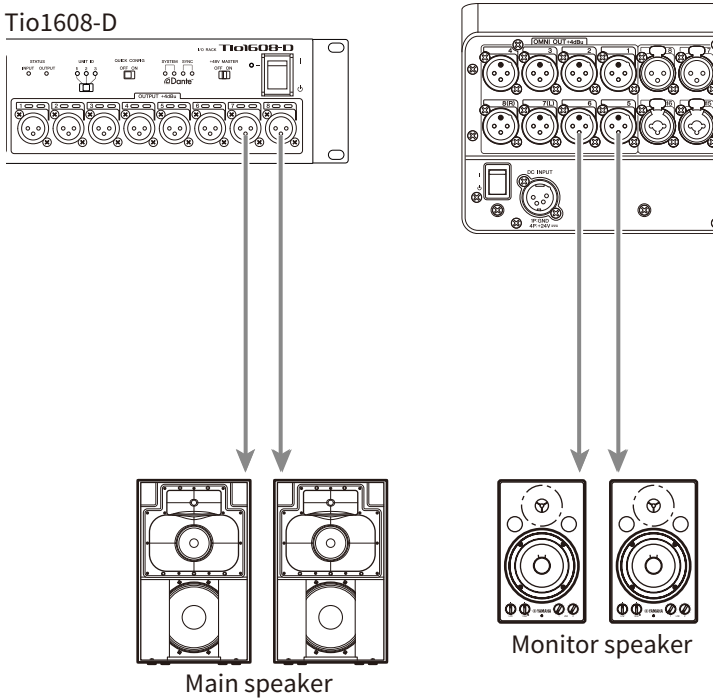

## Analog output connections

Signals such as the output signals of output-related channels (MIX, MATRIX, STEREO (L/R), monitor signals (MONITOR OUT L/R channel) and direct output signals of INPUT channels) can be patched to the OMNI OUT connectors of the DM3 series and OUTPUT jacks of I/O devices.

The top panel of the DM3 series is equipped with a PHONES OUT jack for monitoring, so the signal selected as the monitor source can always be monitored. In addition, that same signal can be monitored over an external speaker by assigning the MONITOR OUT L/R channel to the desired output jack.

### Tio1608-D



Switching of patches is configured on the SETUP screen → PATCH screen. Patch switching can also be made from OUTPUT screen → OUTPUT CH PATCH screen.

## Dante Network Connections

### I/O device connections

---

A DM3 can be connected to a I/O device (such as Tio1608-D) in 2 ways--via a daisy chain or star connection.

In addition, devices with 2 ports, a main line (PRIMARY) and sub-line (SECONDARY) can be connected to each other with a redundant connection, which is resistant to failures.

The DM3 can be easily configured with its Auto Setup function using a Dante patch to supported I/O devices.

## Dante Auto Setup Function

---

The Auto Setup function of DM3 automatically configures Dante patches for the DM3 to compatible devices in the Dante network.

Instead of using external software like a Dante Controller, it makes it easy to set up patches between the DM3 console and compatible devices.

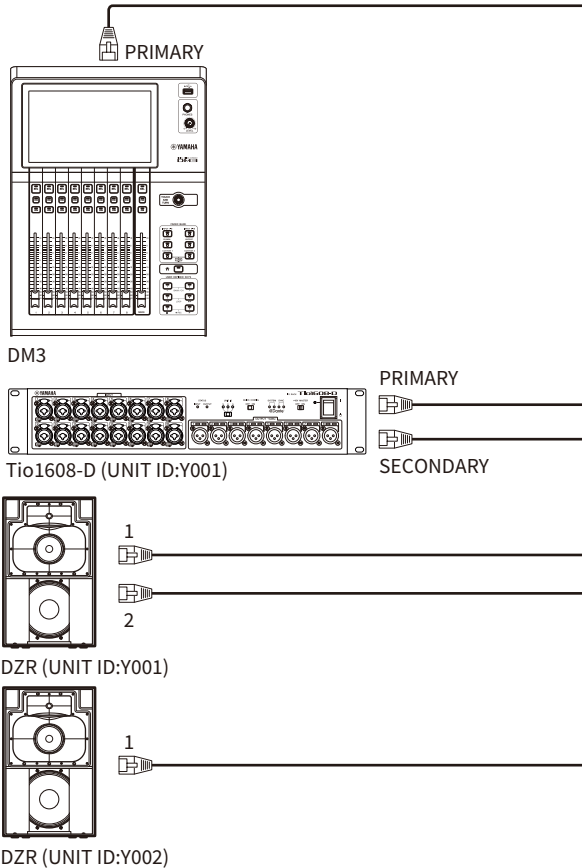
## Daisy chain connections

A daisy chain is one way of connecting devices like a string of beads. It is a simple network structure with no need for network switches. It is used for simple systems with only a few connected devices.

The more devices are connected, the more latency is required. In addition, if a system failure occurs, such as a disconnected cable, it cuts off the network at that point, and communication with further devices in the chain is lost.

### ■ Example of connection of AUTO SETUP DM3 and I/O device

Make connections as follows using the Dante connector of an I/O device with the DM3.

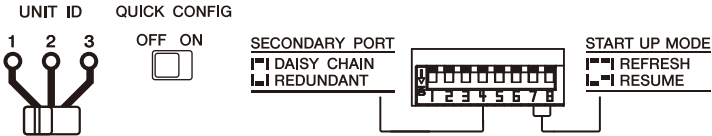


### ■ Configuration of I/O devices

Configure as follows when connecting to Tio1608-D or DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D using the DM3 AUTO SETUP function.

### [Configuration of Tio1608-D]

- UNIT ID = 1
- SECONDARY PORT = DAISY CHAIN
- START UP MODE = REFRESH
- QUICK CONFIG = OFF



### [Configuration of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D]

- UNIT ID = any ID from 1-8
- MODE (DANTE MODE) = STANDARD

When using Dante Controller instead of AUTO SETUP, configure each of the I/O devices according to their instructions.

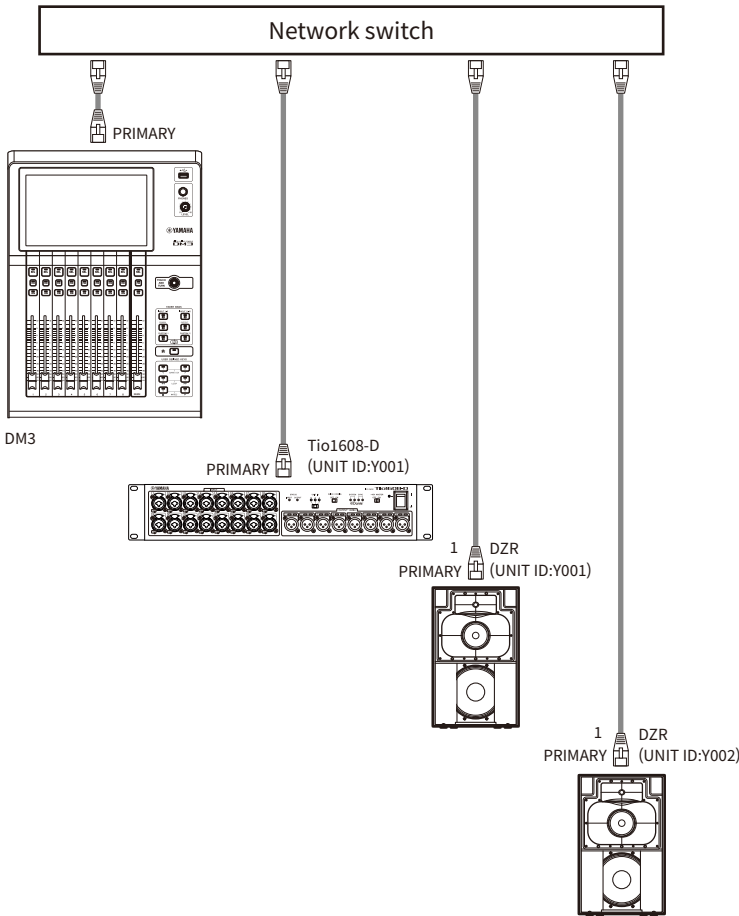
Configure the UNIT ID of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D on the DANTE SETUP screen of the DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D speaker.

## Star connections

Star connection refers to a method of connecting devices with a network switch in the middle. It can be used for a large network that requires a wide bandwidth by using a network switch that supports a Gigabyte Ethernet network switch. We recommend having various network switch functions (such as clock synchronization of any data line, or QoS that prioritizes voice transmission) for the purpose of controlling and monitoring the network.

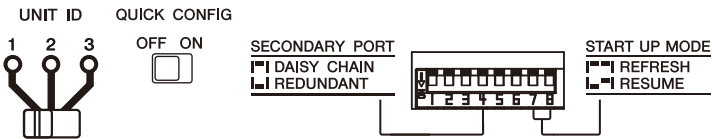

Configure as follows when connecting to Tio1608-D or DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D using the DM3 AUTO SETUP function.

- UNIT ID = 1
- SECONDARY PORT = DAISY CHAIN
- START UP MODE = REFRESH
- QUICK CONFIG = OFF



### [Configuration of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D]

- UNIT ID = any ID from 1-8
- MODE (DANTE MODE) = STANDARD

When using Dante Controller instead of AUTO SETUP, configure each of the I/O devices according to their instructions.

Configure the UNIT ID of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D on the DANTE SETUP screen of the DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D speaker.

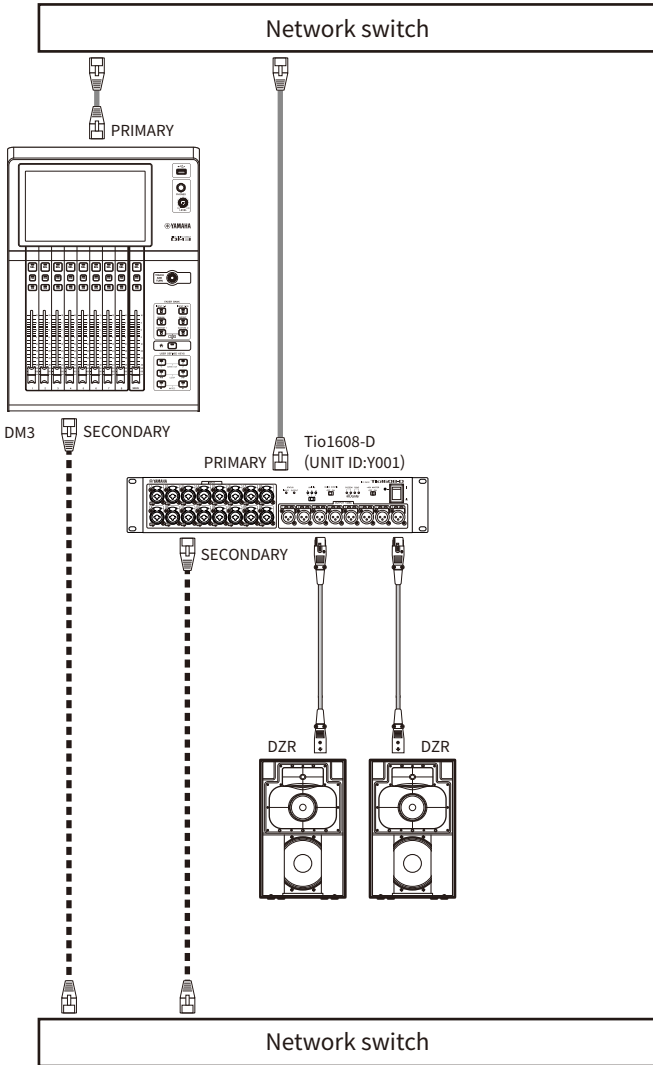
## Redundant connections

---

Redundant connections entail a network consisting of 2 lines, a main line (PRIMARY) and a sub-line (SECONDARY). Normally the PRIMARY line carries communications, but if a problem occurs, such as an interruption to the PRIMARY line, then communications switch automatically to the SECONDARY line. A network environment more resistant to failures can be built by connecting in this way in a star configuration than by a network constructed in a daisy chain.

## ■ Configuration of I/O devices

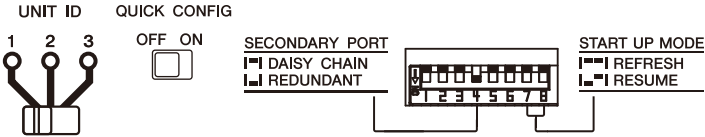
Configure as follows when connecting to Tio1608-D or DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D using the DM3 AUTO SETUP function.

### [Configuration of Tio1608-D]

- UNIT ID = 1
- SECONDARY PORT = REDUNDANT



- START UP MODE = REFRESH
- QUICK CONFIG = OFF



### [Configuration of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D]

- UNIT ID = any ID from 1-8
- MODE (DANTE MODE) = STANDARD

When using Dante Controller instead of AUTO SETUP, configure each of the I/O devices according to their instructions.

Configure the UNIT ID of DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D on the DANTE SETUP screen of the DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D speaker.

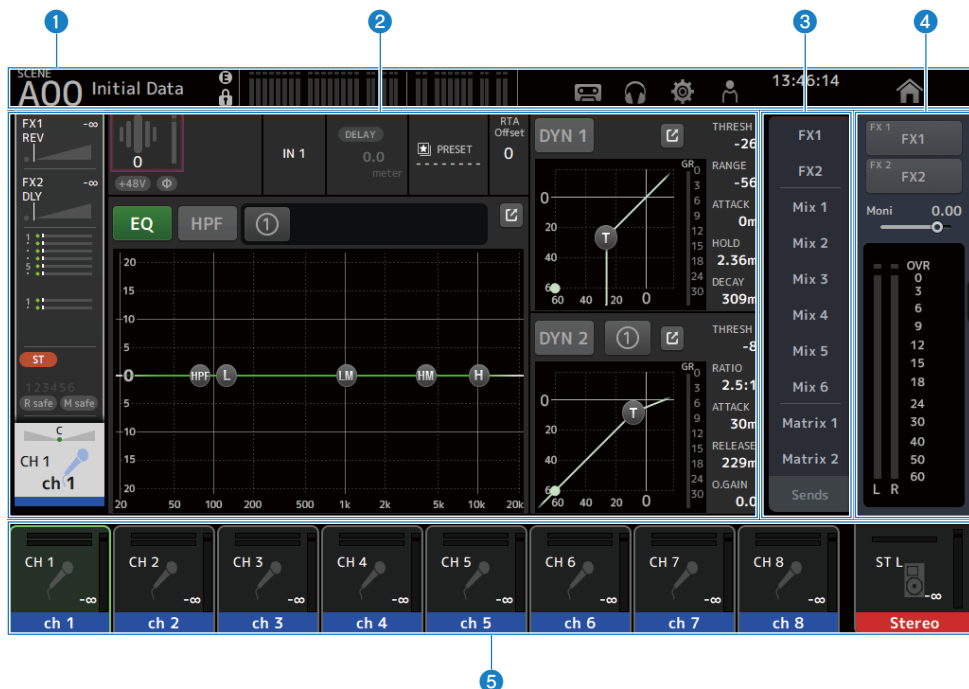
### NOTE

- HA remote cannot be operated from the SECONDARY side.
- No SECONDARY function is available under DZR-D/DXS-XLF-D Dante.

# Overview of screens

## Breakdown of screens

The display of the console can be broadly divided into 5 areas.



- 1 **Tool bar** (p.53)
- 2 **Main area**
- 3 **SENDS ON FADER area** (p.234)
- 4 **ADMIN area** (p.235)
- 5 **Channel Name area** (p.236)

### ■ Content displayed in main area

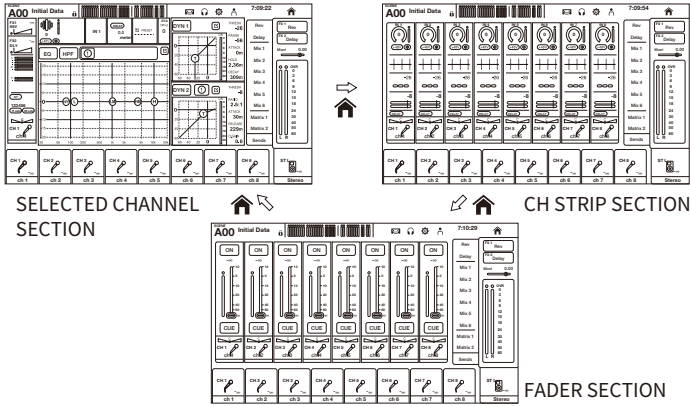
What is displayed in the main area changes according to what icons and/or channels are selected.

The channel setting status is displayed all together on the HOME screen. (p.151)

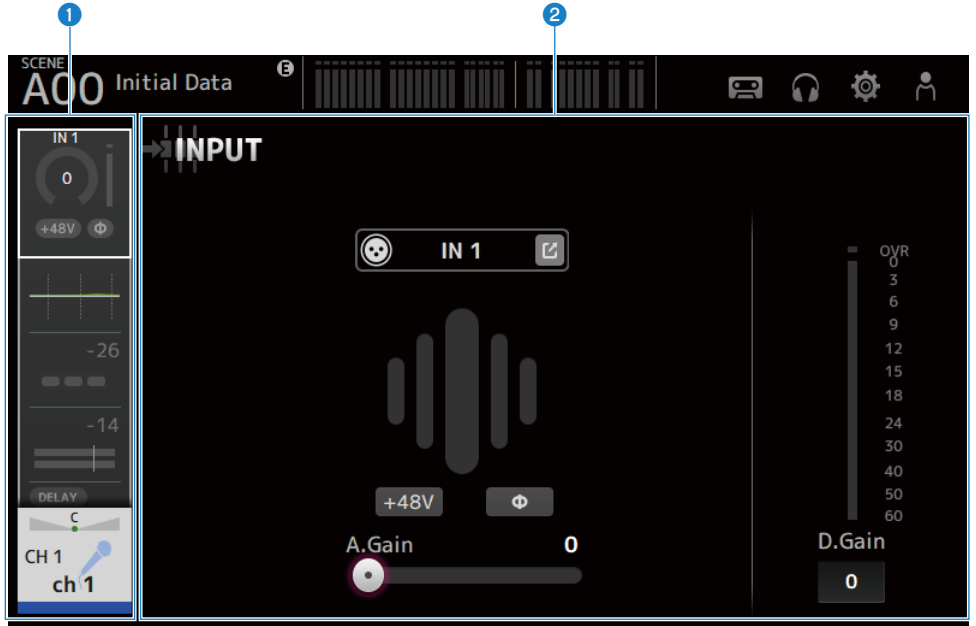
The HOME screen has 3 types of screen, which are displayed in units of 8 channels, or of 1 channel.

The display changes each time [HOME] key/HOME button is pressed.

The configuration screen is for making advanced settings to the selected channel(s).

- 2 Details area

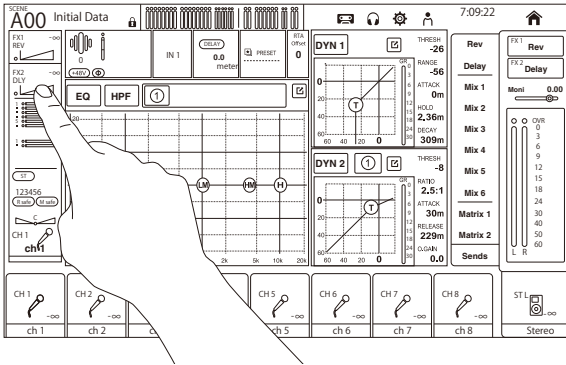
# Basic operation of screens

The display can be operated by touching it. You can also use the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to fine tune parameters. In addition to touch and double-touch, you can also slide, swipe, pinch-in and pinch-out the screen.

## Switching screens

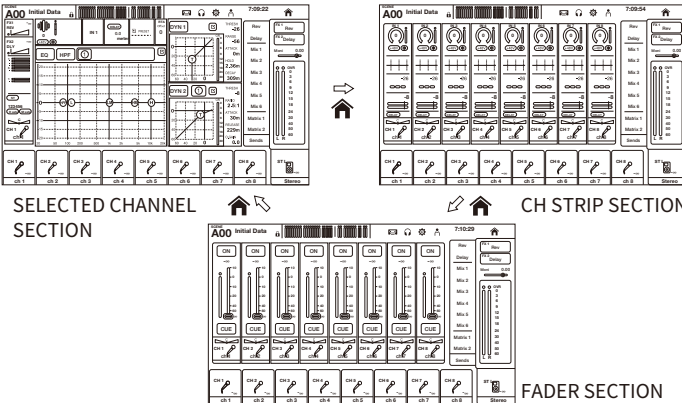
Touching the box at the top of the screen switches to the configuration screen.

Press the HOME button/[HOME] key to return to the HOME screen.



## NOTE

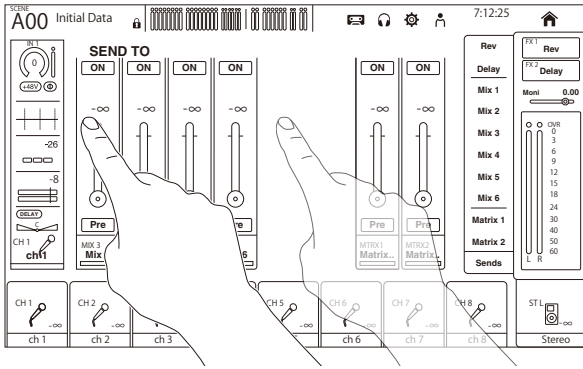
You can choose what is displayed on the HOME screen by selecting Key Function → [HOME] Key from SETUP screen → PREFERENCE screen. When multiple items are selected, the display will change with each press of the HOME button/[HOME] key.



## Scrolling

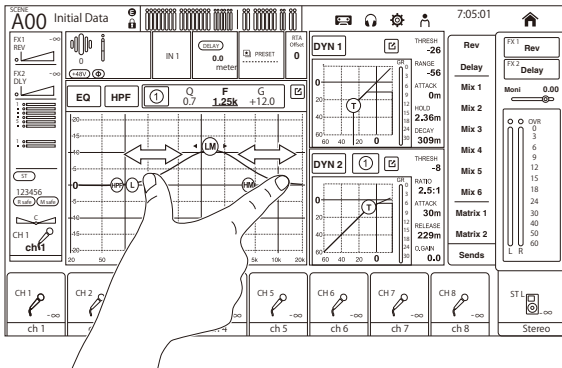
On screens that have a scroll bar, sliding the screen up/down or left/right displays the next screen.

Swiping allows high-speed scrolling.



### ■ Operating the Q of EQ

When in the manual mode while on the EQ screen, selecting a handle and pinching in/out on it performs Q operation on the selected handle.

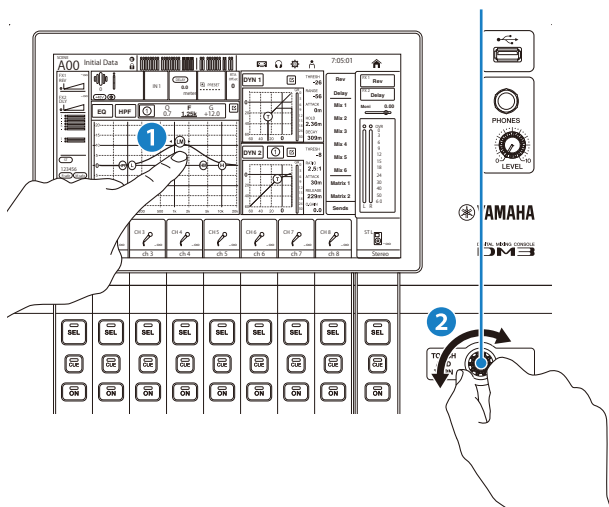


### NOTE

This operation is not available in the 1-knob mode, which is for controlling multiple parameters with 1 knob. Select the manual mode with the mode switching button at the top of the screen.

### ■ Operating parameters with the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob

As illustrated below, after touching (1) the desired parameter to select it, operate it with the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob (2). The selected parameter is displayed with a pink frame.



## NOTE

The 1-knob mode

- The 1-knob mode was designed to make it easy to operate multiple parameters for the EQ and the Compressor via the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob. When the 1-knob mode is active, the parameters cannot be operated individually. The 1-knob mode can be turned ON/OFF from the EQ and Compressor screens.

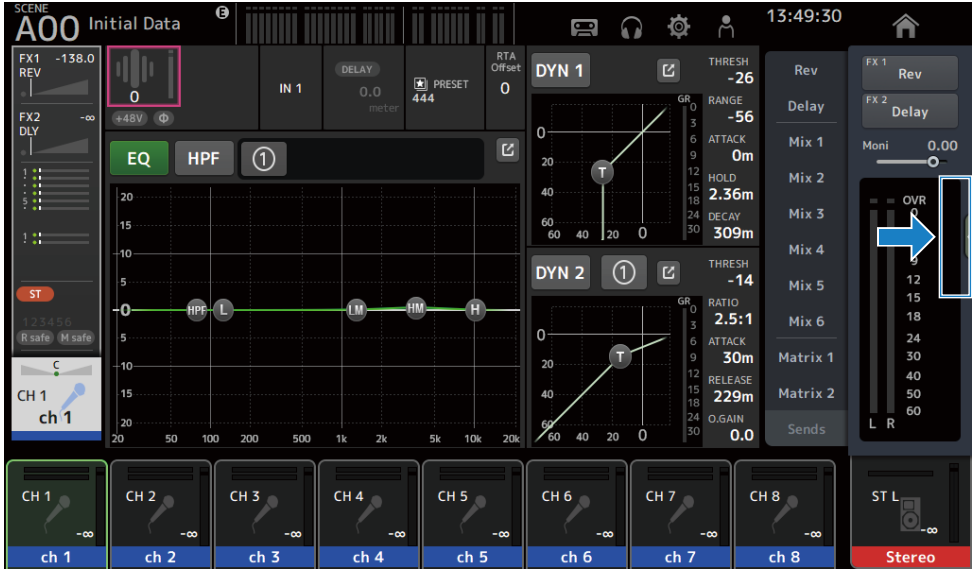

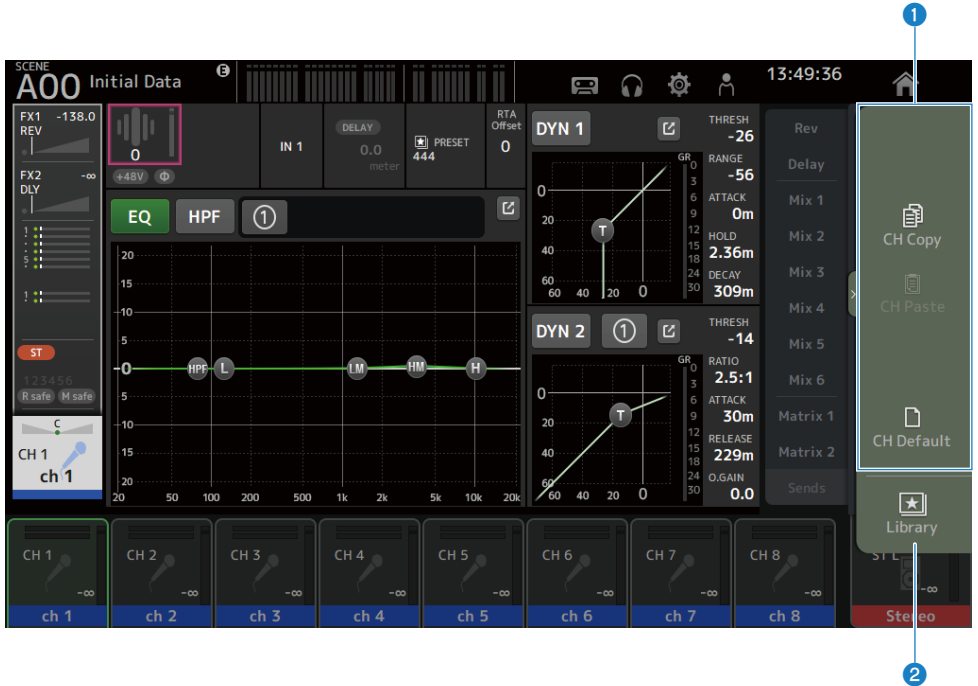
## Menus

Swipe left on the menu swipe indicator on the right of the screen to open the menu.

This opens a menu of options for operating the current screen.

The items in the menu vary with the displayed screen. For information about each menu, refer to the description for that screen.





**1 Menus**

The items in the menu vary with the displayed screen. For information about each menu, refer to the description for that screen.

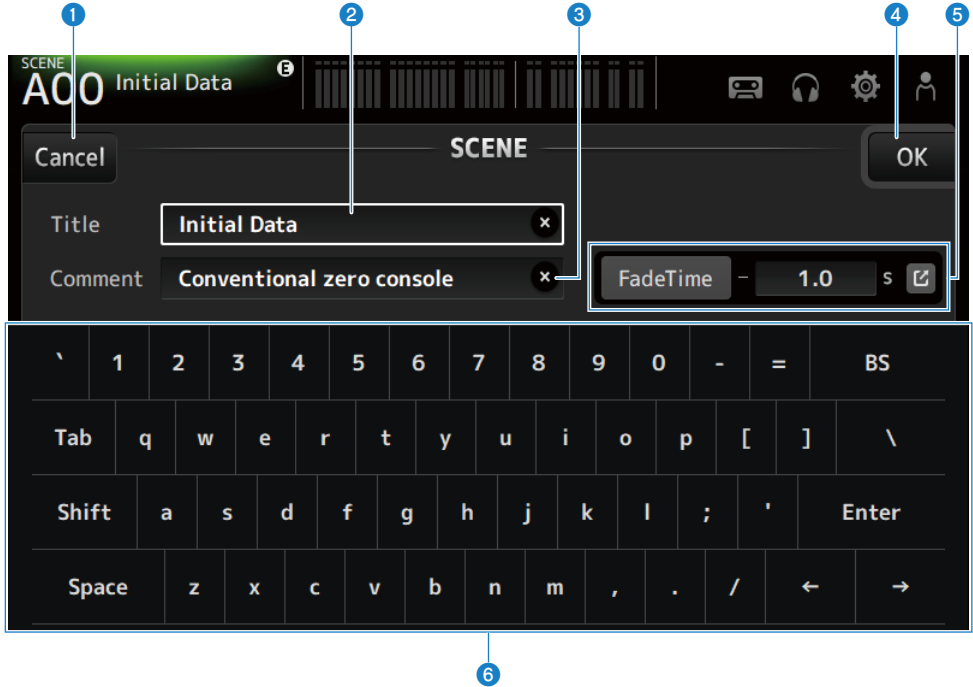
**2 Library button**

Touch the Library button to open the channel presets LIBRARY screen.



## SOFT KEYBOARD screen

Titles and comments can be edited from the SOFT KEYBOARD screen. The content displayed varies with the screen. The SOFT KEYBOARD screen displayed when saving a scene is described here as an example.



**1 Cancel button**

Cancels editing and goes back to the previous screen.

**2 Title field**

Enter a name for the scene.

**3 Comment field**

Enter any additional information.

**4 OK button**

Saves the results of editing.

**5 Fade Time settings**

Specifies fade time settings and switches fade times used in scenes ON/OFF. To display the FADE TIME screen, touch the button on the right edge.

**6 Keyboard**

Enters letters that are touched.

## Operating buttons and sliders

---

### ■ Close button

Touch to close the current screen.



### ■ OK button

Clears entered information.

Displays the relevant screen.



### ■ Slider

Touch to enable, indicated by flashing in pink.

Drag sliders on the display or turn the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to make settings.



### ■ Pan slider

Touch to enable operation via the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob, indicated by flashing in pink.



### ■ Balance slider

Touch to enable operation via the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob, indicated by flashing in pink.



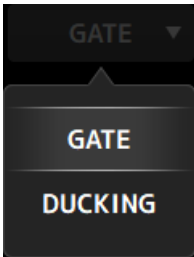
### ■ Edit icon

Opens a screen for editing information, such as the keyboard screen.



### ■ Menu

Touch a button with [▼] displayed on it to display the menu.



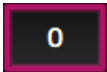
### ■ Text box

For text boxes that allow numeric entries, touch to enable changes, which is indicated by flashing in pink.

While flashing in pink, touch to open a screen for entering a numeric value.

The value can also be set by turning the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob.

For text boxes that allow text entries, touch to open the SOFT KEYBOARD screen.



### ■ ON and OFF

Touch to toggle a function between ON and OFF.

## Toolbar

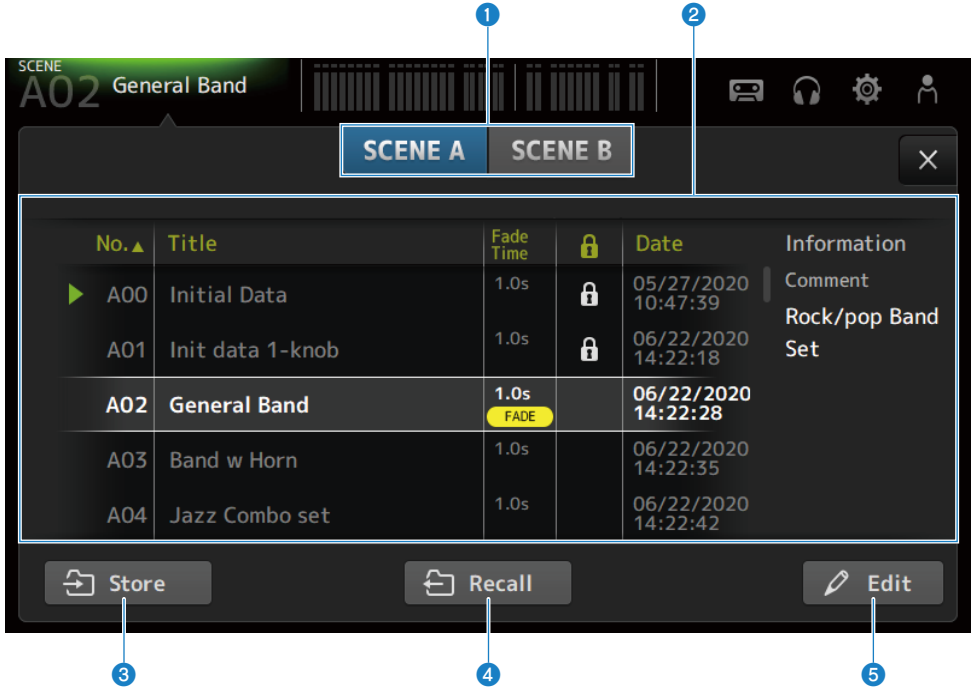

# SCENE screen

## SCENE screen

The SCENE screen is for managing previously saved mixer configurations, or “Scenes”.

When recalling a scene, you can exempt certain settings from being recalled (called “recall safe”).



**1 Scene list selection button**

Allows you to switch between the available scene lists.

**2 Scene list**

Displays a list of saved scenes.

You can touch a header in the list to sort the items by that header (except for Information).

To select a scene, simply touch it. The selected scene is highlighted, and can then be saved, recalled, or edited.

A green triangle is displayed in front of the scene that is currently recalled.

The Fade Time field indicates whether the Fade Time function is enabled or not and its set time.

A lock icon is displayed or cleared each time you touch the column. When the icon is displayed, the scene is write-protected.

The last save date for a scene is displayed in the Date column.

**3 Store button**

Saves the current mixer settings to the scene number selected in the scene list.  
Touch to open the screen for editing the title and comments.

**4 Recall button**

Recalls the scene selected in the scene list.

**5 Edit button**

Touch to open the screen for editing the title and comments.

**SCENE screen menu**

Swipe left on the menu swipe indicator on the right of the SCENE screen to open the following menu.



**1 Copy**

Copies settings of the selected scene.

**2 Cut**

Cuts settings of the selected scene.

**3 Paste**

Pastes the copied or cut scene to the selected line.

**4 Delete**

Deletes the selected scene.

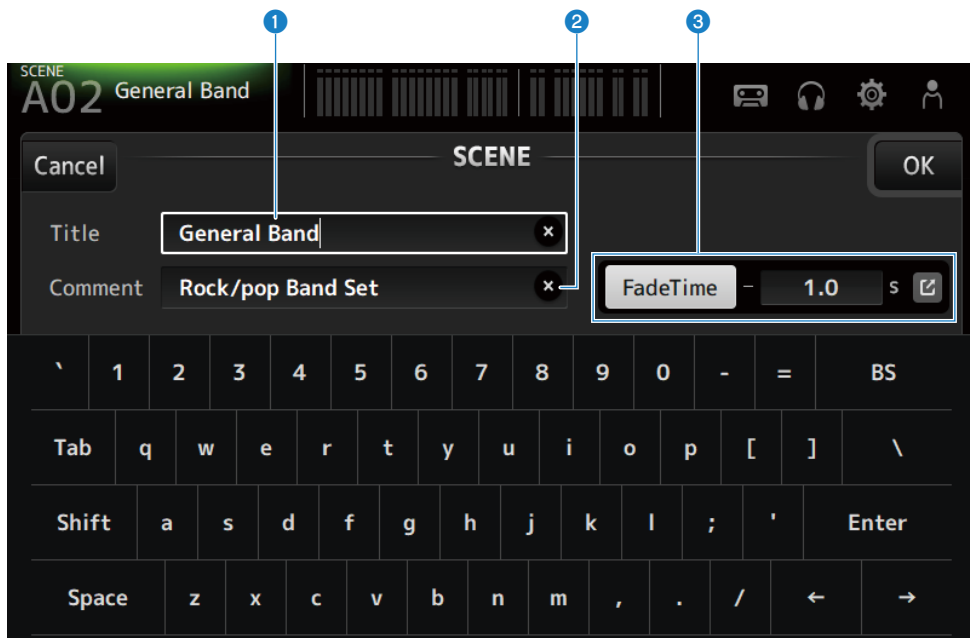

## SCENE EDIT screen

The SCENE EDIT screen is for configuring the title, comments and fade time for a scene.



### 1 Title text box

Enter a name for the scene.

### 2 Comment text box

Enter any additional information about the scene.

### 3 Fade Time settings

Specifies fade time settings and switches fade times used in scenes ON/OFF. Touch the jump button to open the FADE TIME screen.

Touch a text box, and then with it highlighted, the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob can be used.

## FADE TIME screen

When on the FADE TIME screen, the channels to apply the fade time of a scene can be turned ON/OFF individually.

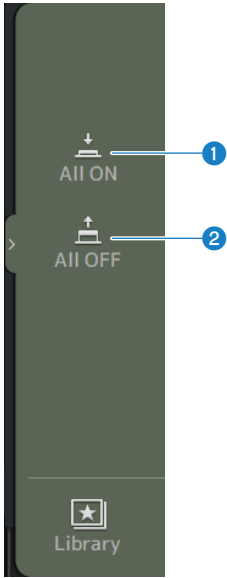

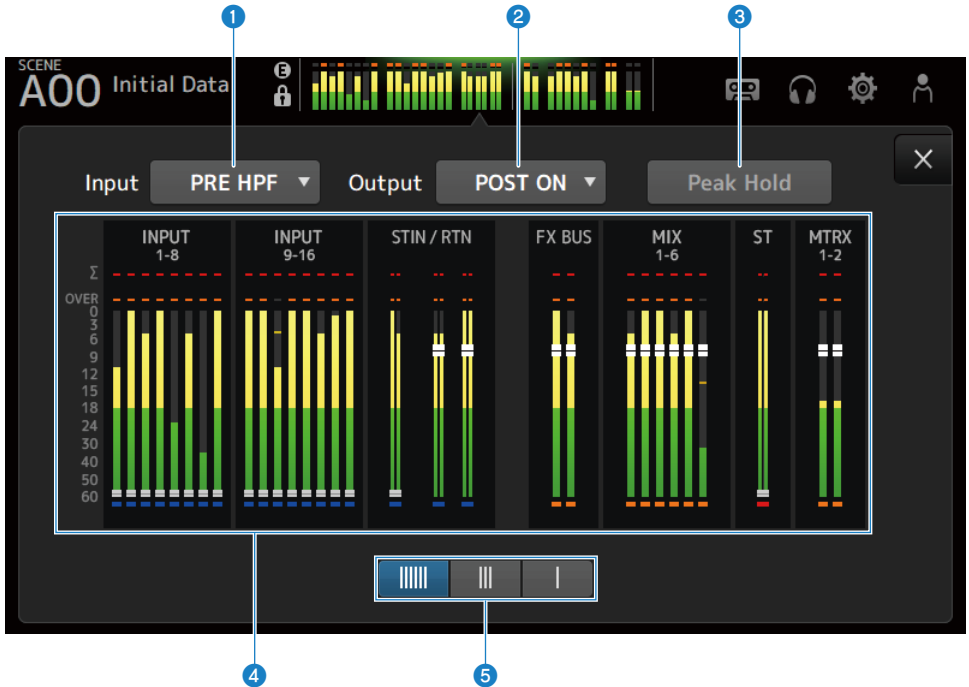

## METER screen

While on the METER screen, the IN/OUT levels of all channels can be displayed and the metering point (point to detect levels) of level meters can be switched.



### 1 Input metering point selection menu

Select the metering point of the input level from the menu.

- **PRE HPF :**  
Just before the head amp (just before HPF)
- **PRE FADER :**  
Just before the fader
- **POST ON :**  
Right after the [ON] key

### 2 Output metering point selection menu

Select the metering point of the output level from the menu.

Just before the fader
- **POST ON :**  
Right after the [ON] key

**3 Peak Hold button**

When turned ON, it holds the peak of each meter. When turned OFF, the display of peak levels held to that point is cleared. Both the input and output channels are affected when the Peak Hold button is turned ON/OFF.

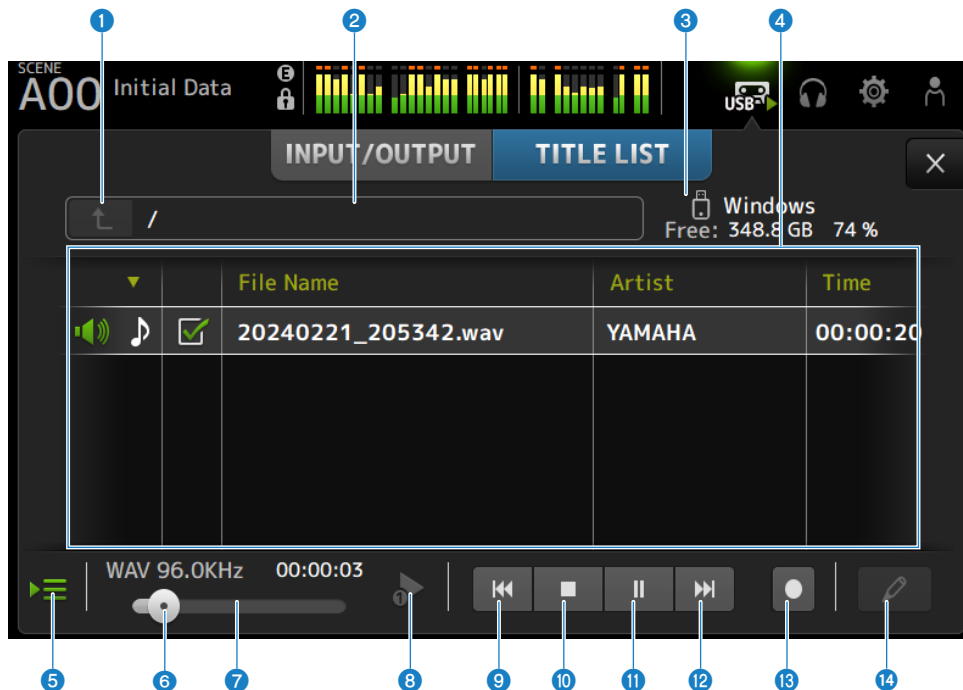
## RECORDER Screen

### RECORDER (TITLE LIST) screen

Available functions from the RECORDER (TITLE LIST) screen include playing song files (BGM and sound effects) on the USB storage device plugged in the USB connector, or record a 2 MIX source (STEREO or MIX channel) to the USB storage device.

#### NOTE

- Recording and playing cannot be done at the same time.
- The signal being recorded cannot be input to the INPUT channel.
- FAT32/exFAT formatted USB storage devices can be used. If needed, connect one to the USB connector (right side of top panel) and format it from the menu on the SAVE/LOAD screen.
- To record, use a USB storage device that can write at the speed of a HDD or SSD. Also, try recording on your USB storage device ahead of time to make sure it can write fast enough.
- To play MP3 files, they must have sample rates of 44.1 or 48 kHz and a bit rate of between 128 - 320 kbps. VBR (variable bit rate) files can also be played, but song length and elapsed time are not displayed accurately.
- To record MP3 files, they must have sample rates of 48 kHz and a bit rate of 128, 256 or 320 kbps.
- To record WAV files, they must be recorded at 96 kHz and 24-bit or 48 kHz and 24-bit with the leader clock at 96 kHz, or 48 kHz and 24-bit with the leader clock at 48 kHz.
- If the number of items, including that of folders exceeds 150, they cannot be displayed in the song list. If there are more than 150 songs, divide them into separate folders.
- The maximum size for long recordings is 2 GB. To continue recording for a long time, split the data when it exceeds 2 GB.





**1 Parent directory button**

Displays the directory one level above the current directory.

**2 Current directory**

Displays the current directory path for the USB storage device directory.

**3 USB storage device information**

Displays the volume name of the USB storage device.

It also shows the amount and percentage of free space on the USB storage device.

**4 File list**

Displays the music files in the current directory.

You can click a header in the list to sort the items by that header.

Touch to select the name of a song file, and then play, pause or edit it.

If the check box is enabled, a file will be played when all songs are played.

The file name is displayed in the File Name column.

Artist information is displayed in the Artist field and length in the Time field.

If the number of items, including that of folders exceeds 150, they cannot be displayed in the song list and operations **5** to **13** are not available.

In such case, "Recorder supports a maximum of 150 items in a folder. Please remove some files from this folder to continue." is displayed.

**5 Follow playback button**

During continuous playback, the current song is highlighted in the song list and this button turns the follow function ON/OFF. When ON, selecting a different file turns the function OFF.

**6 Playback Position Knob**

This is displayed during playback or pause.

With touch and focus, slide the playback position knob or turn the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to change the playback position.

When you operate it during playback, playback will resume from that position.

**7 Song file information display/indicator**

While playing an MP3 file, this shows its bit rate and playback position.

While playing a WAV file, this shows its sample rate and playback position.

While recording an MP3 file, this shows the elapsed recording time.

While recording a WAV file, this shows its sample rate and elapsed recording time.

**8 Playback mode selector button**

Specifies the loop play mode setting.

Touch to toggle through the available modes.



plays one song one time (SINGLE).



plays one song repeatedly (SINGLE REPEAT).



Plays all the songs that are checked in the song list (ALL).



Plays all songs marked with a check mark repeatedly (ALL REPEAT).

**9 PREVIOUS button**

Touch to move playback position to the beginning of the current, or of the previous song.

If you press and hold this during playback, the playback position will move back 2 seconds.

When you release from holding, playback resumes from the moved position.

**10 Stop button**

Stops recording or playing.

**11 Play/pause button**

Plays or pauses the song.

**12 NEXT button**

Starts playing at the beginning of the next song.

If you press and hold this during playback, the playback position will move forward 2 seconds.

When you release from holding, playback resumes from the moved position.

**13 Record button**

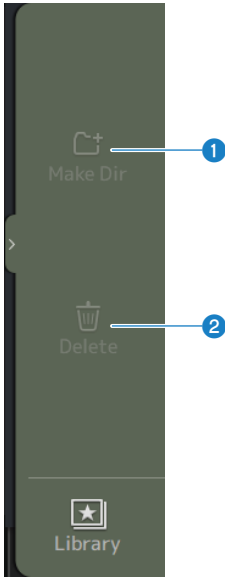
Activates the standby mode for recording. If the number of audio files inside a folder, including the number of folders, exceeds 150, the record button will not work.

**14 Edit file name button**

Opens the SOFT KEYBOARD screen for editing the file name.

**RECORDER screen menu**

Swipe left on the menu swipe indicator on the right of the RECORDER screen to open the following menu.



**1 Make Dir**

Creates a new directory in the current directory. If the number of audio files inside a folder, including the number of folders, exceeds 150, Make Dir will not work.

**2 Delete**

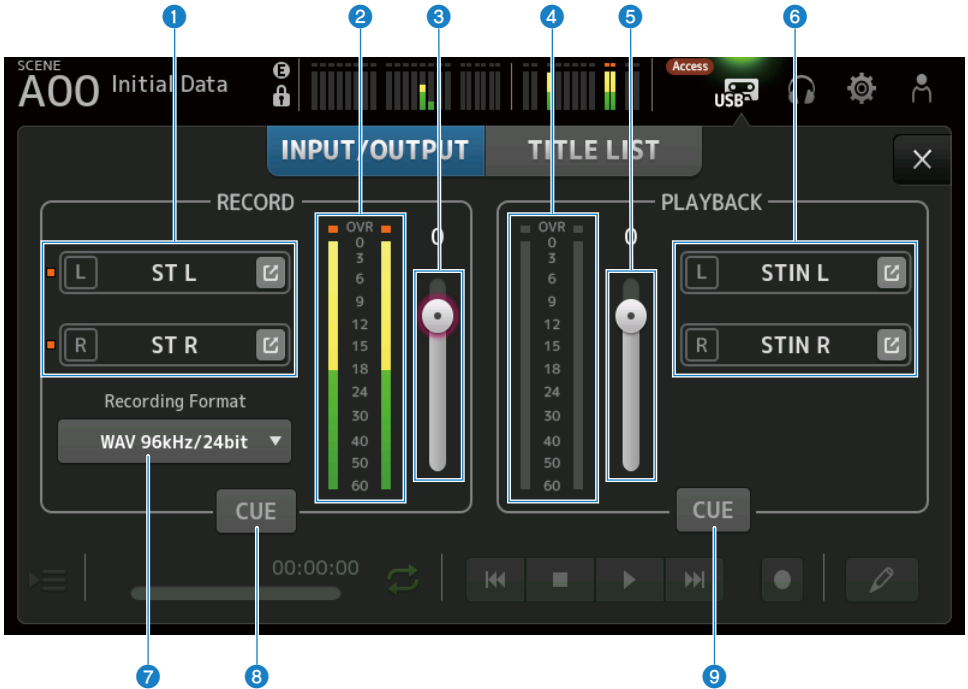

## RECORDER (INPUT/OUTPUT) screen

The RECORDER (INPUT/OUTPUT) screen is for operating RECORDER inputs and outputs.



**1 Record source selection buttons**

The channel name(s) to be recorded are displayed. The indicator lights if the recording source level is too high. Touch the jump button to open the RECORDER PATCH screen.

**2 RECORD level meter**

Displays the recording volume level.

**3 RECORD level slider**

Sets the recording volume level.

**4 Playback level meter**

Displays the play volume level.

**5 Play volume level slider**

Sets the play volume level.

**6 Playback channel selection button**

Selects the channel to play the audio data of the USB storage device. Touch the jump button to open the PLAYBACK PATCH screen.

**7 Recording format selection menu**

Touch to open the menu and then select the recording format.

Choose from the following recording formats.

- MP3 48 kHz / 128 kbps
- MP3 48 kHz / 256 kbps
- MP3 48 kHz / 320 kbps
- WAV 48 kHz / 24 bit
- WAV 96 kHz / 24 bit

**NOTE**

WAV 96 kHz / 24 bit can only be selected if the leader clock is on 96 kHz.

**8 Record CUE button**

Turns the CUE of the recording source ON and OFF.

**9 Playback CUE button**

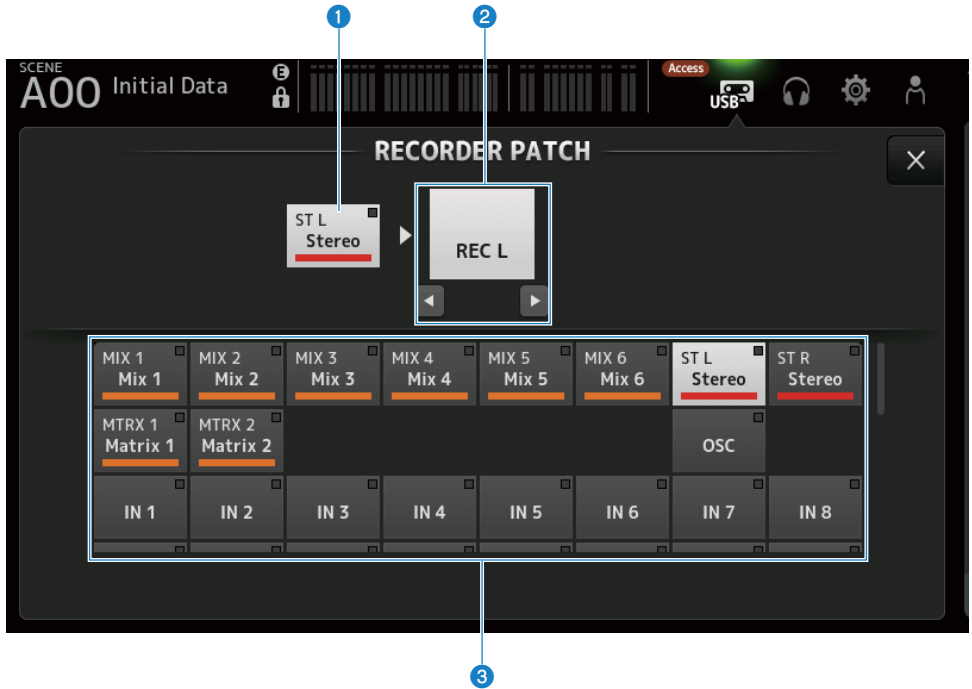

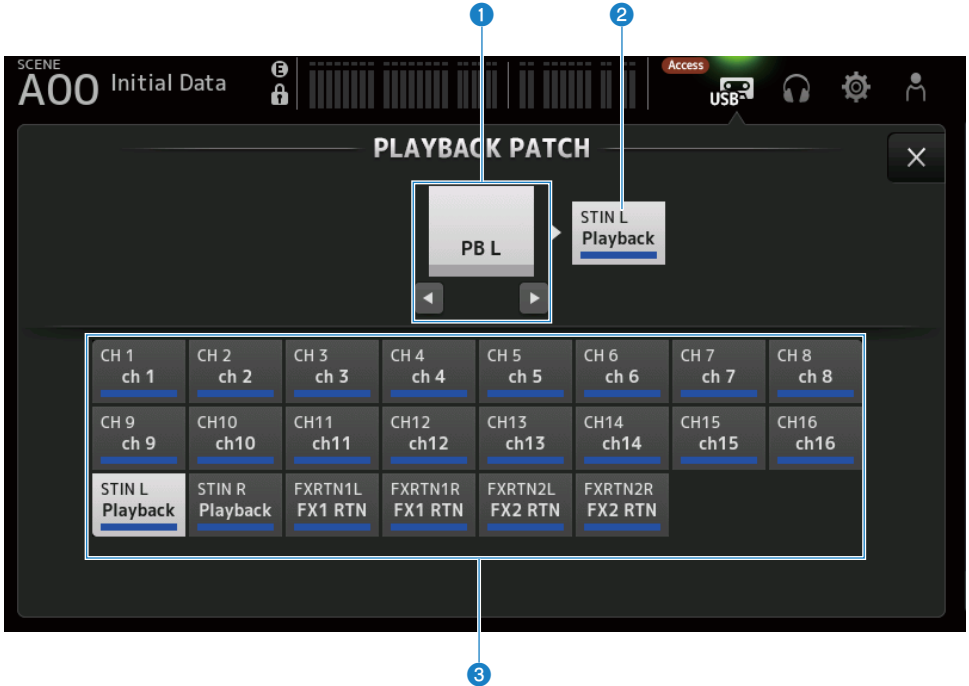

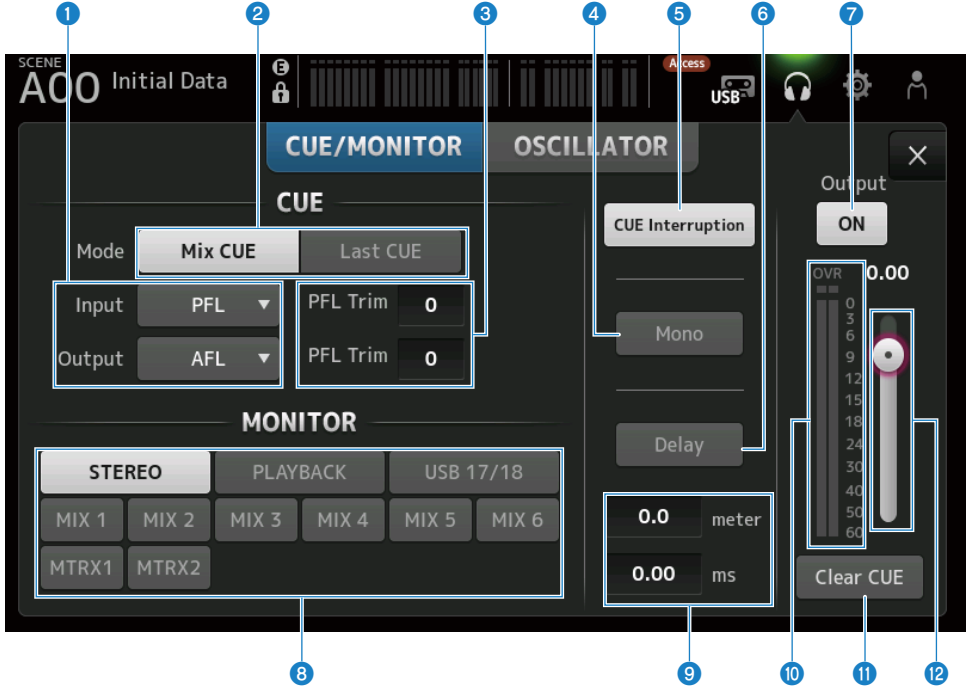


## MONITOR screen

### MONITOR (CUE/MONITOR) screen

The MONITOR (CUE/MONITOR) screen is for controlling the signals that are monitored with headphones or near-field monitors.

It allows you to select the source to be continuously monitored and to change the monitor signal to mono or add a delay. The CUE function can also be used for monitoring individual channels.



#### 1 CUE point selection buttons

Selects the point in the signal path to be monitored.

- **PFL** :  
Just before the fader
- **AFL** :  
After the fader
- **POST PAN** :  
After the pan

**2 CUE Mode button**

Used to switch the CUE mode.

- **Mix CUE :**  
Enables CUE for multiple channels.
- **Last CUE :**  
Enables CUE for the last channel selected.

**3 PFL Trim setting text box**

For adjusting the CUE monitor volume when PFL is selected. It can be set in the range of -30 to +20 dB.  
Touch to display the input screen for each value.

**4 Mono button**

When turned ON, the monitor signal changes to mono.

**5 Cue Interruption button**

Toggles whether the CUE interrupts the monitor output.

**6 Delay button**

Delays the monitor signal.

Used when a time difference exists due to distance between the mixer and the FOH speaker.

**7 Monitor output button**

Turns the monitor output ON and OFF.

The signal is output to the [PHONES] connector regardless of this setting.

**8 Monitor selection buttons**

For selecting the monitor source.

**9 Delay setting text box**

Delay can be specified by frame, meter, sample, feet or ms.

The unit can be selected by PREFERENCE screen → Other → Display Delay Scale.

Touch to display the input screen for each value.

**10 Monitor level meter**

Displays the monitor level.

**11 Clear CUE button**

Clears all CUE as a batch.

**12 Monitor level slider**

Adjusts the monitor output level.

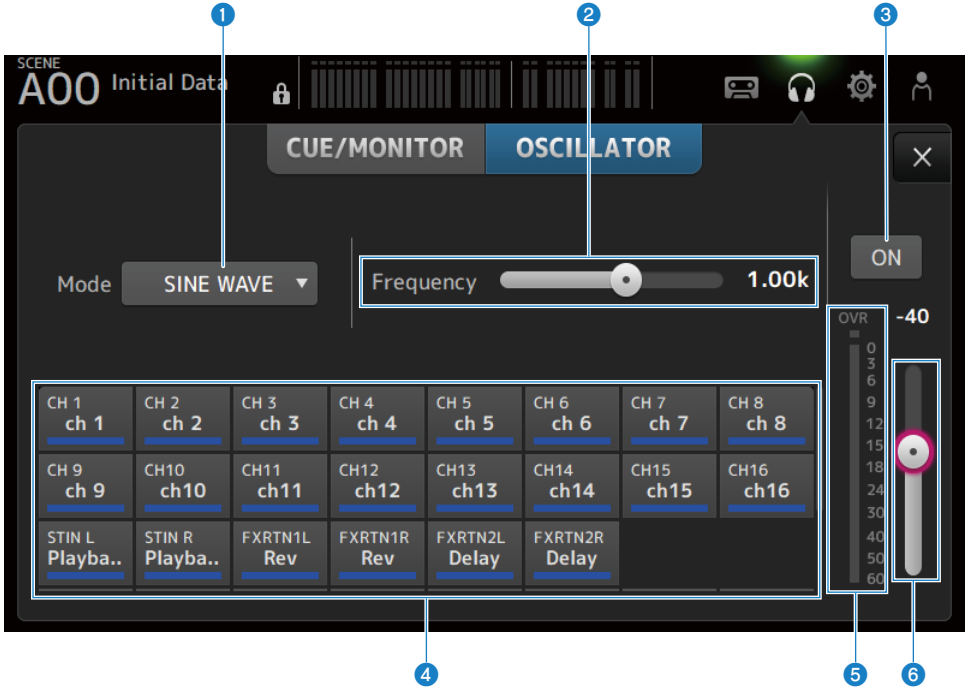

## MONITOR (OSCILLATOR) screen

The MONITOR (OSCILLATOR) screen allows you to check the oscillator settings and turn it ON/OFF. The DM3 series has a built-in oscillator, which can be used to output signals like sine waves or pink noise to any channel for checking external devices and testing the characteristics of the venue.



### 1 Oscillator mode button

For selecting from the following 3 oscillators.

- **SINE WAVE** :  
Outputs a continuous sine wave.
- **PINK NOISE** :  
Outputs pink noise continuously.
- **BURST NOISE** :  
Outputs pink noise in bursts.

### 2 Parameter field

Available parameters are displayed according to the oscillator mode.

When the oscillator mode is set to SINE WAVE, this sets the oscillator frequency.

When the oscillator mode is BURST NOISE, this sets the Width (length of noise) and the Interval (time between noises).

When the oscillator mode is PINK NOISE, nothing is displayed.

**3 Oscillator output button**

Turns the oscillator output ON and OFF. When ON, the oscillator signal is sent to the bus or input channel selected with the assign buttons.

**4 Oscillator assign buttons**

Determine which channels the oscillator output signal is sent to. Touch buttons to specify the individual channel(s) (multiple may be selected).

**5 Oscillator output level meter**

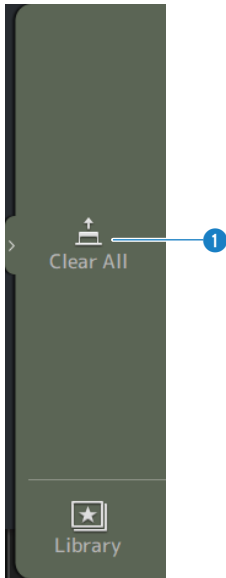
Displays the oscillator output level.

**6 Oscillator output level slider**

Adjusts the oscillator output level.

Saved files and subdirectories are displayed on the SAVE/LOAD screen.



**1 Parent directory button**

Moves up one directory in the current directory.  
The button greys out if the current directory is already at the top.

**2 Current directory display**

Displays the path of the current directory.

**3 Volume name display**

Displays the volume name and free space of the USB storage device.  
The message “Calculating Size” is displayed while calculating the free space, and operations that involve access to the USB storage device are not available.  
The time required to calculate free space depends on the capacity of the connected USB storage device. It may take 3 minutes or more to calculate the free space of a large USB storage device.

#### 4 **File list**

Displays files and subdirectories saved on the USB storage device. When an item is highlighted, it indicates it is selected and subject to subsequent operations.

Touch a header in the file list to sort by that header. The sort order toggles between ascending and descending each time it is touched.

- **File Name :**

Displays file and DM3 directory name, as well as an icon indicating the type.

- **Comment :**

Displays comments entered in series files.

- **Date :**

Displays the “date modified” of the file.

#### 5 **Save As button**

Saves the internal settings of DM3 series as a new file.

#### 6 **Save button**

Overwrites and saves the internal settings of the DM3 series.

#### 7 **Load button**

Loads the selected DM3 series settings file.

The settings files of TF series can be loaded. When loaded, the file is converted for use by DM3 series.

Image files (png, bmp, jpg, jpeg files) displayed on the CONSOLE LOCK screen can also be loaded.

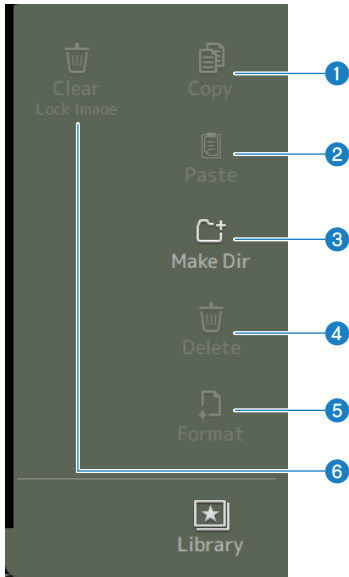

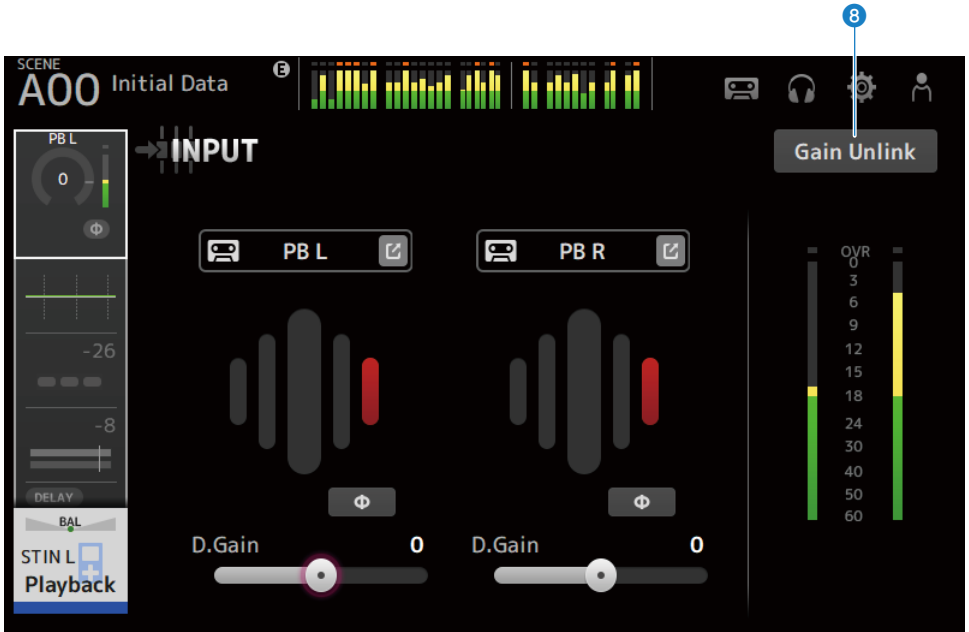

- When USB is selected, the gain slider becomes digital gain and the +48V button is hidden.

- When DANTE is selected and input is from a device that cannot operate the head amp, the gain slider becomes digital gain and the +48V button is hidden.

Even if the input source is set to DANTE, OFFLINE is displayed if the DANTE device is on an offline channel, or if DANTE is working on a secondary port.



If the input source is set to DANTE, ERROR is displayed if an error occurs.



**2 GainFinder**

Displays the input gain level. When adjusting the input gain, adjust it so it is in the center of the level display. When the input source is set to USB, it displays a digital input gain level.

**3 Level meter**

Displays the gain adjusted level.

**4 Digital gain text box**

Allows you to adjust digital gain. The default setting is 0 dB. You can touch the text box to highlight it, then use the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to adjust the setting. You can also touch the text box again to adjust the setting with the keyboard screen.

### 5 **+48V buttons**

Turns phantom power (+48V) to the head amp ON/OFF.

- **ON:**  
Turns phantom power ON.
- **OFF:**  
Turns phantom power OFF.

When USB is the selected input, the +48V button is not displayed.

#### **NOTICE**

- Phantom power  
When phantom power is not needed, set the +48V button to the OFF position.  
Observe the following when using phantom power to prevent damage to the console or connected devices, and signal noise.
- Turn the +48V button OFF when the device connected to the [INPUT] jack is not compatible with phantom power.
- Do not connect or disconnect cables when the +48V button is ON.
- Before turning the +48V button ON/OFF, set the channel's volume to the minimum level.

#### **NOTE**

When using phantom power, noise may be generated if there is a difference in impedance between the Hot and Cold of the device connected to [INPUT] jack.

### 6 **Gain sliders**

When INPUT is selected for the input, the slider adjusts the analog gain of the head amp.

The PAD (-24 dB) is switched ON/OFF when the analog gain is adjusted between +17 dB and +18 dB.

When USB is selected for the input, the slider adjusts digital gain.

### 7 **Φ (phase) button**

Allows you to change the phase of the signal.

When turned ON, the input signal's phase is inverted.

### 8 **Gain Unlink buttons**

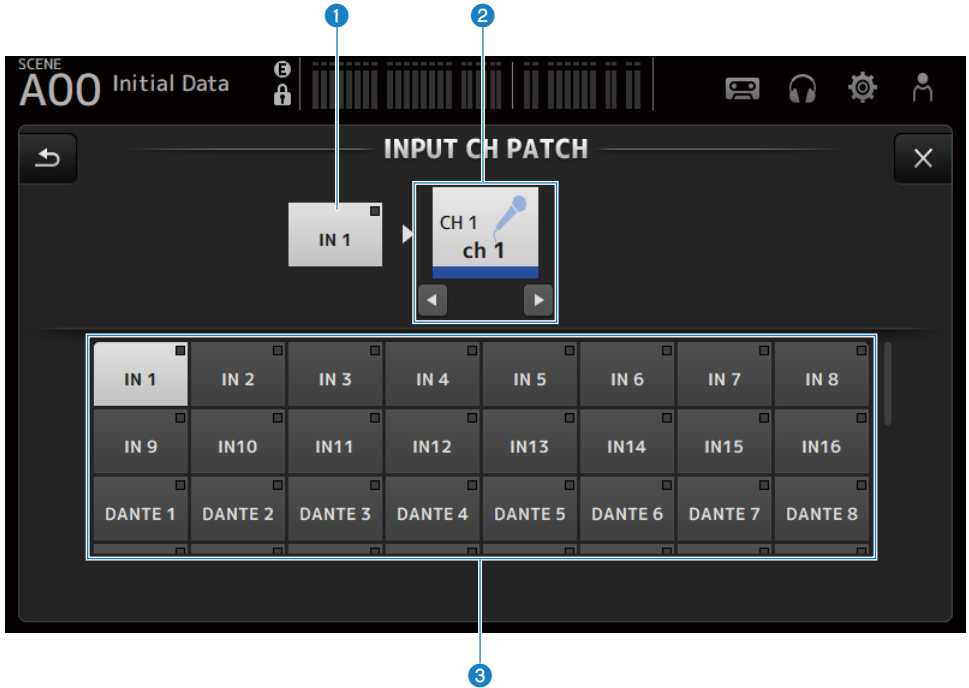
Displayed for stereo channels. While you are touching the button, gain for the left and right channels can temporarily be adjusted individually. When you release the button, the gain for both channels can be adjusted together but the difference in gain between the two channels is maintained.

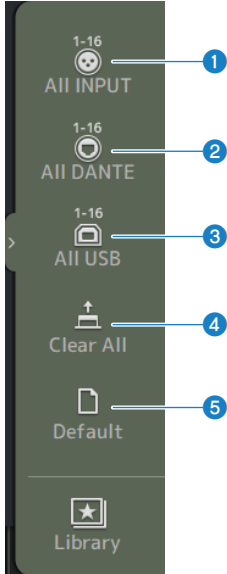

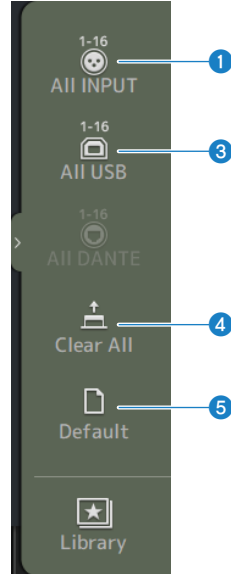

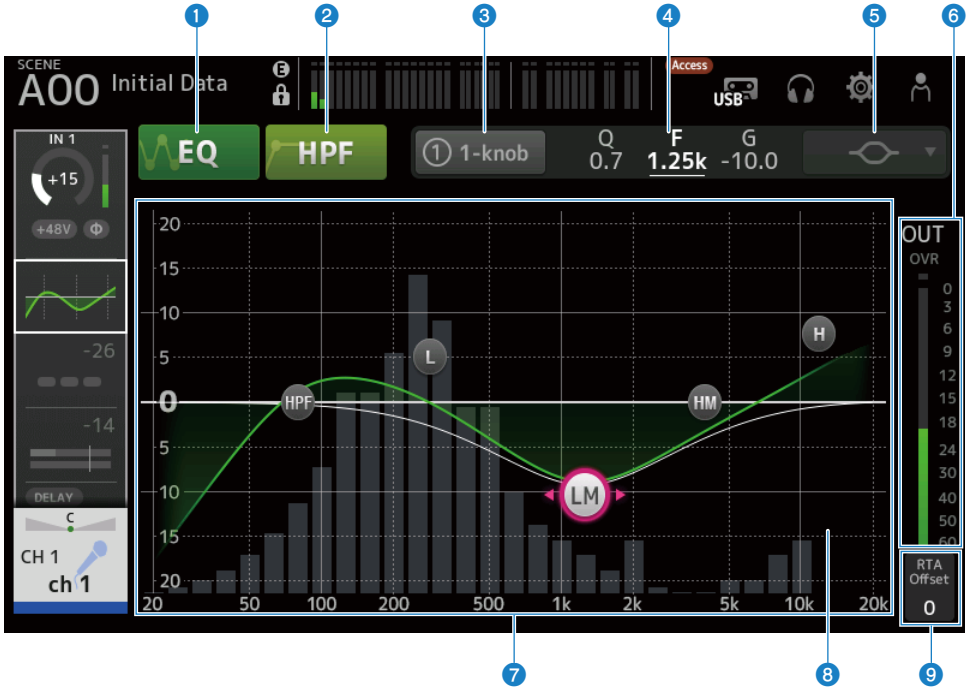

## EQ screen

The EQ screen can be used to correct the frequency characteristics of the audio.

A 4-band parametric EQ is available for CH 1-16, ST IN, FX RTN 1-2, MIX 1-6, STEREO, MATRIX 1-2. A high-pass filter HPF can be used on CH 1-16. This screen also allows you to switch between the easy to operate 1-knob mode just with the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob and the manual mode, where individual parameters can be manipulated.

### ■ 4-band parametric EQ



**1 EQ buttons**

Turns the EQ ON/OFF.

**2 HPF buttons**

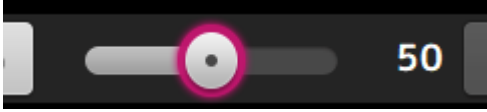
Turns the HPF (high-pass filter) ON/OFF.  
Displayed for CH 1–16.

**3 1-knob buttons**

Switches between 1-knob EQ mode and manual mode.  
When using 1-knob EQ mode, the 1-knob level slider is displayed.

**4 1-knob level slider**

Adjusts the amount of 1-knob EQ applied.



When using manual mode, information about the selected band's Q, F, and G is displayed here.

**5 EQ mode type selection button**

In manual mode, this button selects the filter type. You can switch the filter type between LOW band and HIGH band.

For CH 1-16, the available LOW band filters are low-shelving type and bell type.

For other channel EQs, (i.e., for channel EQs that do not have an HPF), you can choose from HPF, low-shelving, and bell types.

The available HIGH band filters are LPF, high-shelving, and bell types.

In 1-knob EQ mode, you can select the 1-knob EQ type. Select “Vocal” for vocal channels, and “Intensity” for anything else.

When set to “Intensity”, you can adjust the EQ to a setting between flat and a more intense value of EQ settings made using manual mode.

“Loudness” is available for the EQ of output channels. This setting allows you to boost low and high tones.

The available types depend on the channel whose settings you are editing.

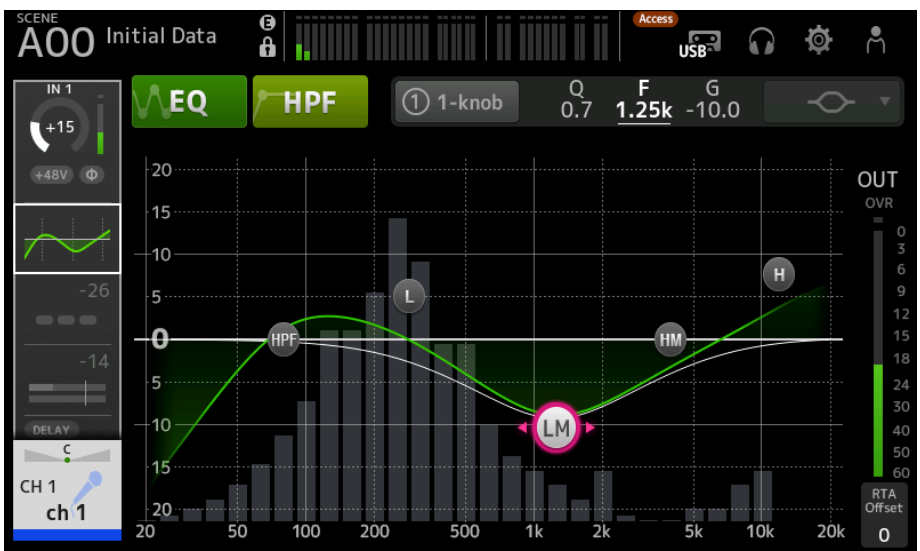
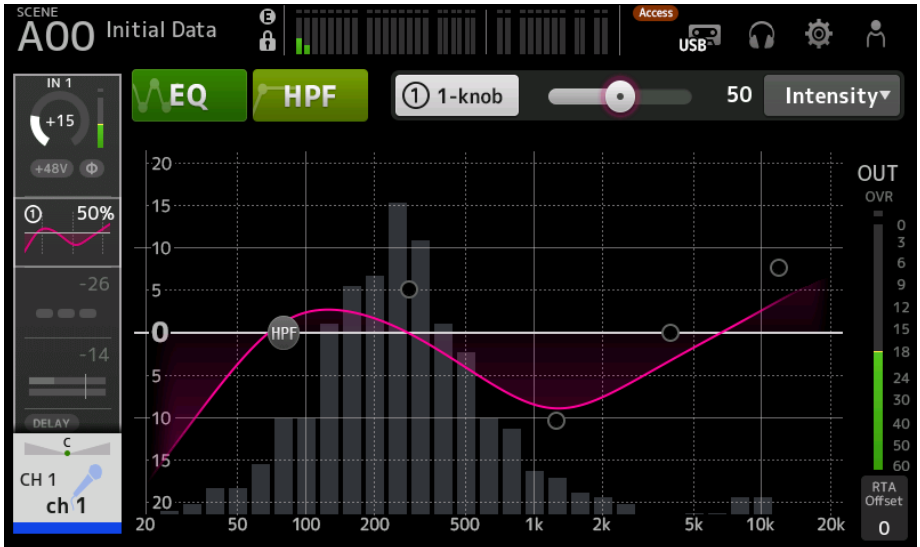
## 7 EQ graph

Displays the parameter settings of the EQ and filter. As you adjust the settings of each band, the results are reflected in the graph.

When using 1-knob EQ mode, you can touch the 1-knob level slider and then adjust the slider using the 1-knob level slider itself or the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob.

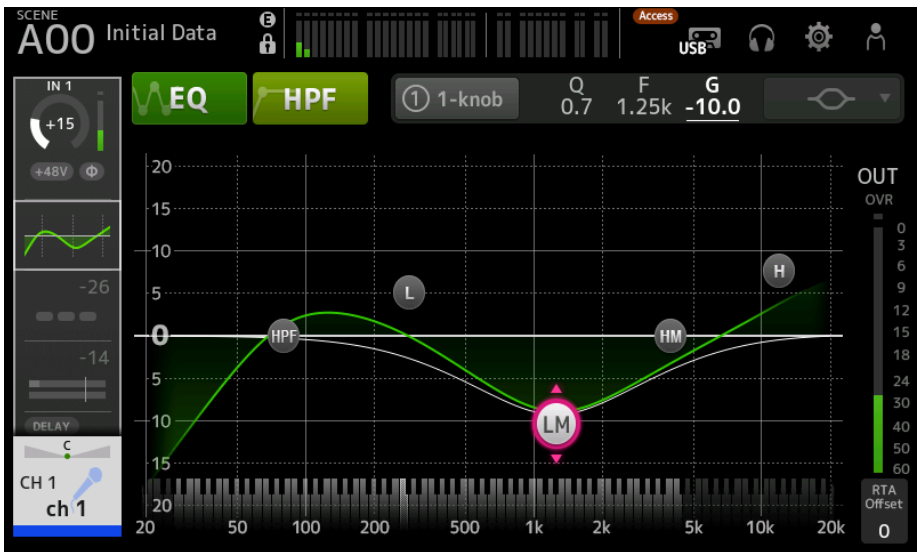
When using manual mode, you can drag the handles in the graph to adjust the settings.

When HPF is turned ON, you can drag the HPF handle to adjust the cutoff frequency. You can also adjust HPF independently when using the Intensity type in the 1-knob EQ mode.



**8 RTA/Keyboard display**

You can touch the bottom of the graph where no parameters are displayed to toggle through RTA, keyboard and no display in order. RTA is a graph that displays the frequencies of the input signal after the EQ is applied. The keyboard display is helpful for understanding the relationship between frequencies and musical pitches.

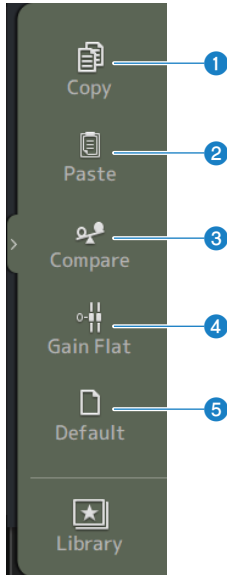


**9 RTA Offset**

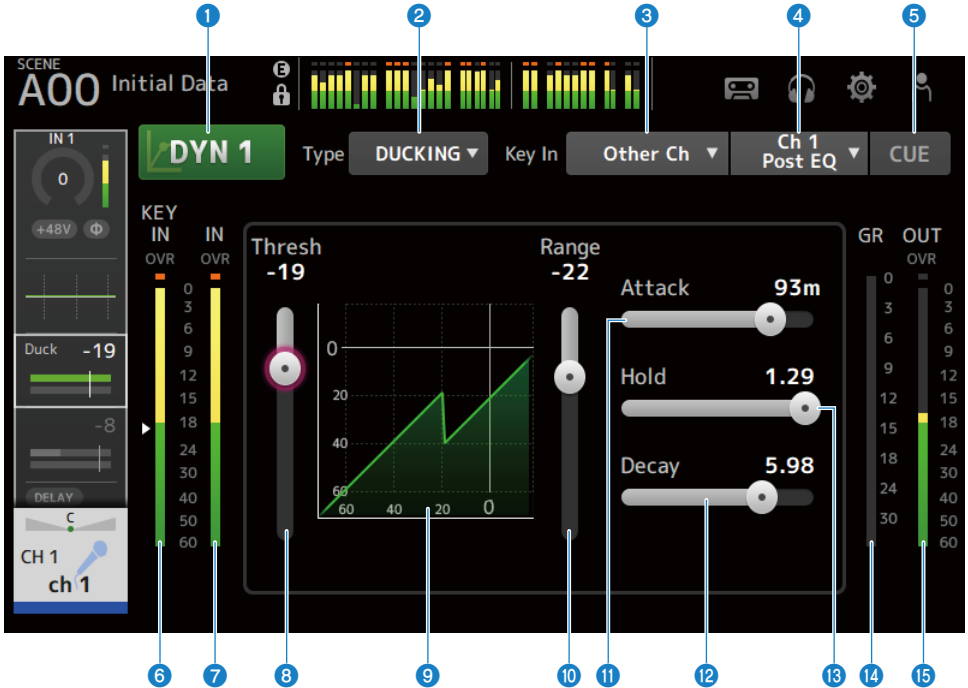

## DYN1 (GATE/DUCKING) screen

When DUCKING is selected, this sets the time until the gate opens after the input signal has passed the HOLD waiting time. The setting value expresses the time required for the level to change by 6 dB.

**13 Hold slider**

When GATE is selected, this sets the waiting time until the gate starts to close after the input signal falls below the threshold level. When DUCKING is selected, this sets the waiting time until the gate starts to open after the input signal falls below the threshold level.

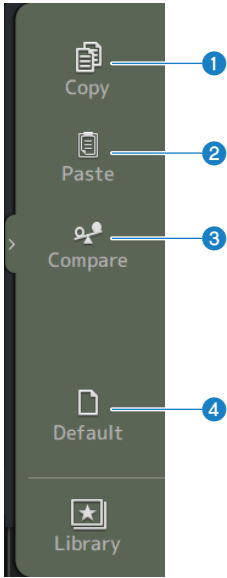

Determines how gradual or sharp the curve is at the threshold. With Soft the compressor is applied smoothly, with Hard, rapidly.

**13 Out Gain slider**

Adjusts the left/right volume balance of the channel.

**5 Channel ON/OFF button**

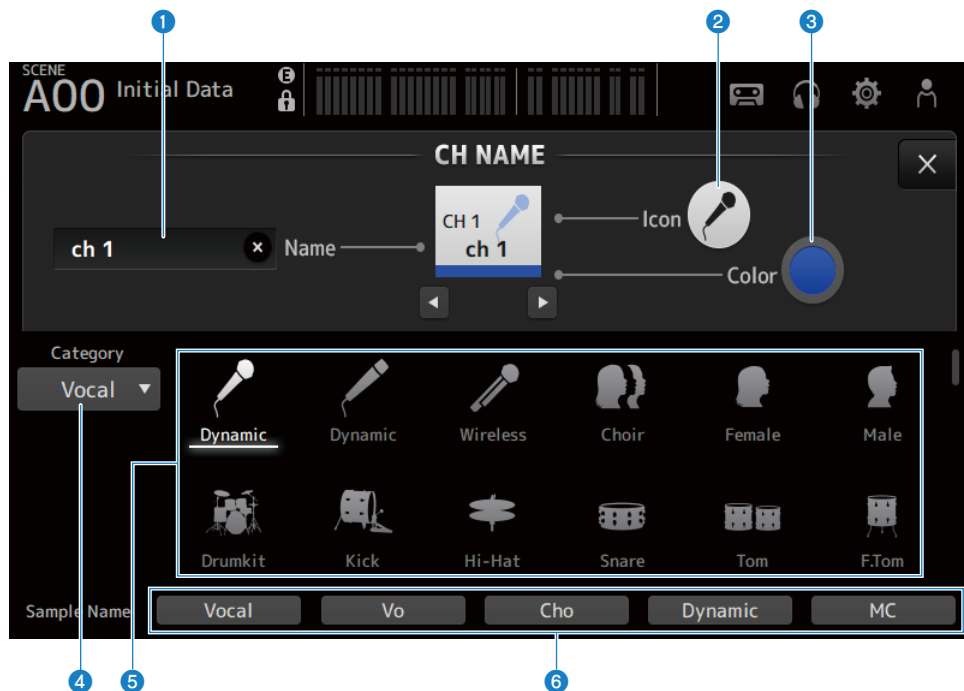

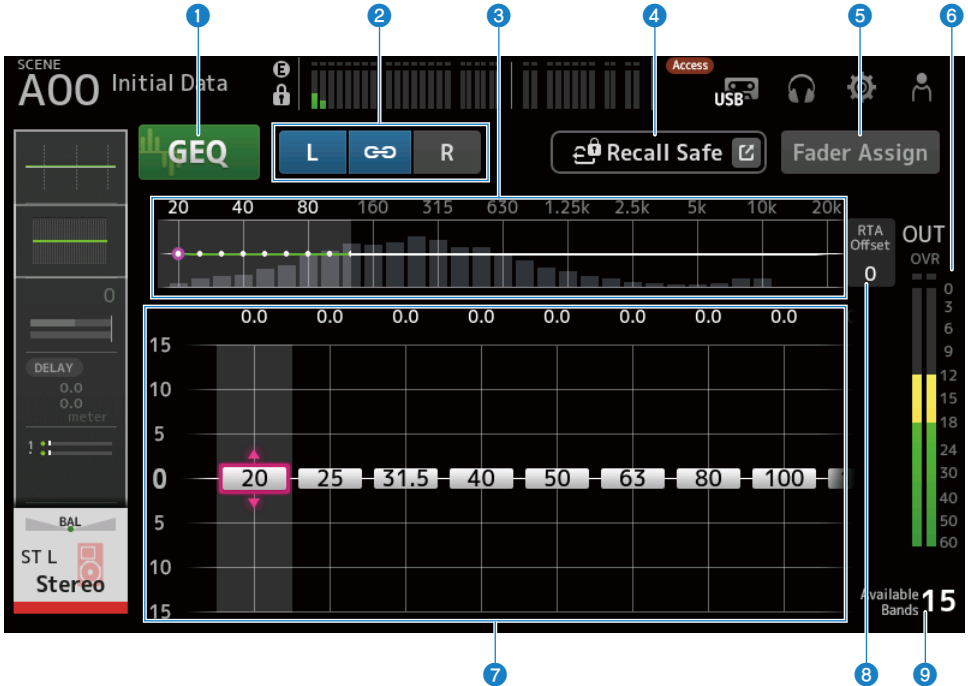

## GEQ screen

The graphic EQ (hereafter GEQ) can be used on MIX 1-6 and STEREO channels.

The GEQ is a mono, 31-band EQ. Each band is 1/3 octave wide, with an adjustable gain range of  $\pm 15$  dB.

The 31Band GEQ has 31 bands, of which you can adjust gain for up to 15 bands.



**1 GEQ buttons**

Turns the GEQ ON/OFF.

**2 GEQ channel/LR Link selection buttons**

Displayed when the signal type selected is MIX channel or STEREO channel.

They are not displayed when monorail or MIX channel are selected.

- **Chain icon:**

The date on which the preset was last saved is displayed in the Date column.

Touch the Rating column to change the number of star icons. Giving more stars the more you like a preset allows you to then sort them by the number of stars.

#### 6 **Preset number display**

Displays the preset number. The first number indicates the number of presets in the selected category, and the second number indicates the total number of presets.

#### 7 **Store button**

Overwrites the current channel settings to the selected preset in the list.

#### 8 **Edit button**

Touch to open the SOFT KEYBOARD for editing the title and comments.

#### 9 **Recall CH button**

Recalls the preset to the selected channel.

Use the DANTE PATCH screen for making patches the DM3 to I/O devices in the Dante audio network.

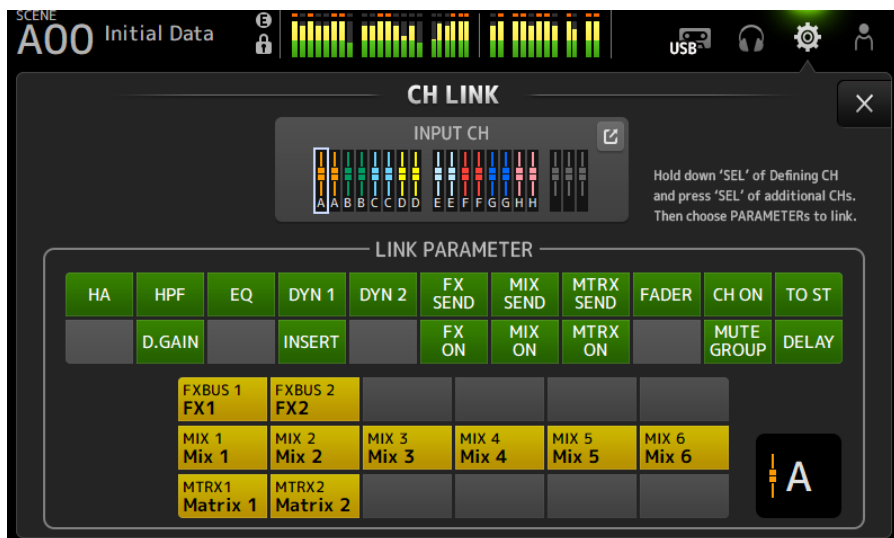

#### NOTE

- You can also open the CH LINK screen by pressing and releasing 2 or more [SEL] keys of channels to be linked at the same time.
- When a [SEL] key of a channel that belongs to a link group is pressed and lit, all the channel [SEL] keys included in the same link group then flash.
- If INPUT channels are linked to ST IN/FX RTN channels, parameters that do not exist on the ST IN/FX RTN channels are ignored.

## Channel-specific screens

### Adjusting EQ in manual mode

This explains how to operate the EQ in manual mode.

- 1** Open the EQ screen.
- 2** Touch the EQ button to turn it ON.
- 3** Touch the 1-knob mode button to turn it OFF.
- 4** Scroll the EQ parameters on the touch screen to adjust the EQ.



#### NOTE

- When an EQ parameter is highlighted, it can be adjusted with the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob. When doing so, each time you touch the EQ parameter, it toggles between its gain (G) and frequency (F). You can also switch between them by touching the value of G and F to right of the 1-knob button.
- To adjust Q, pinch in or out on the touchscreen, or touch the value of Q to the right of the 1-knob button and then use the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to adjust the setting.
- You can select the type of filter for an EQ parameter, depending on the band. The type of filter that can be selected varies with the channel.
  - **L**: Bell, low-shelving, HPF (high-pass filter)
  - **LM, HM**: Bell
  - **H**: Bell, high-shelving, LPF (low-pass filter)

### 5 Turn HPF ON as needed.

When using a vocals mike, you can reduce low-frequency noise by turning the HPF ON.

## Adjusting the send to FX/MIX/MATRIX BUS level with faders

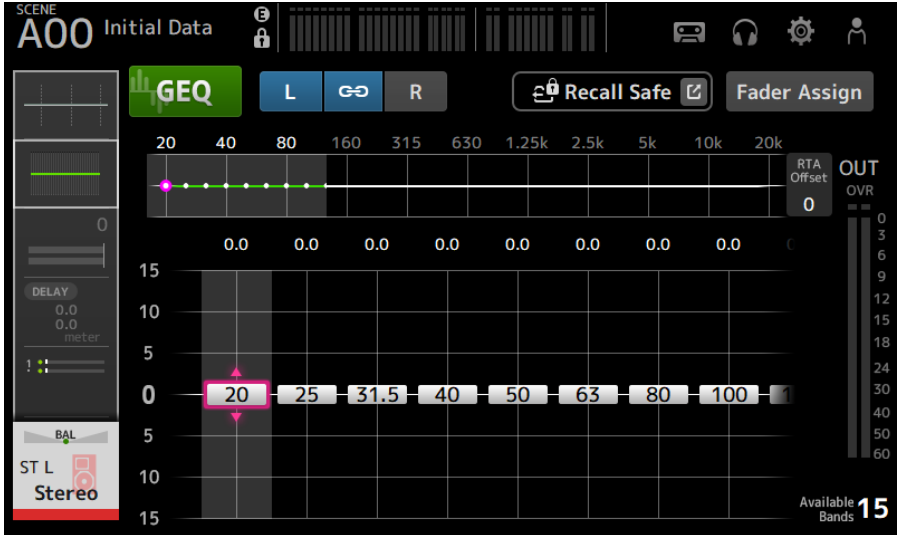

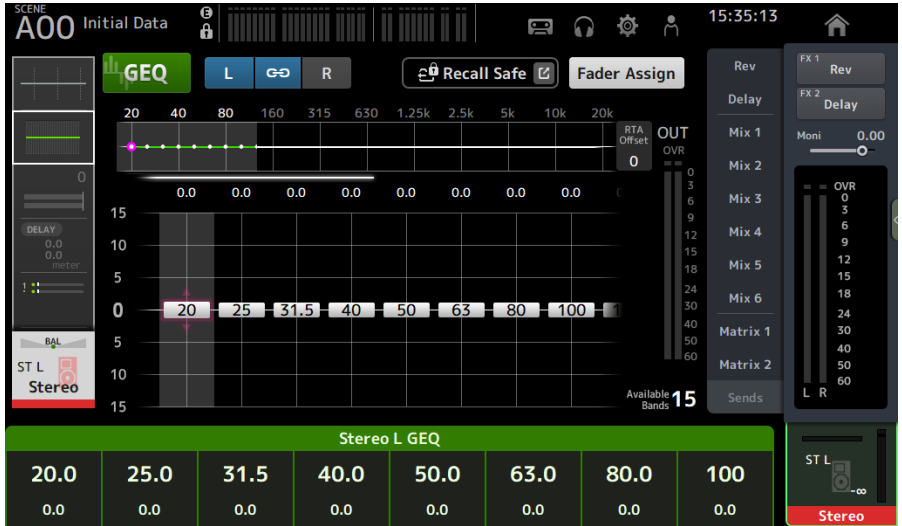

## Using faders to adjust GEQ

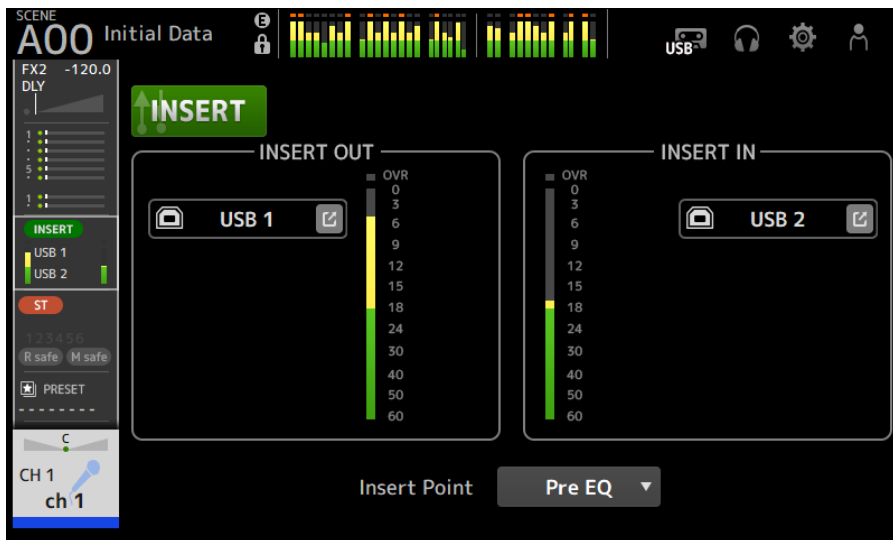

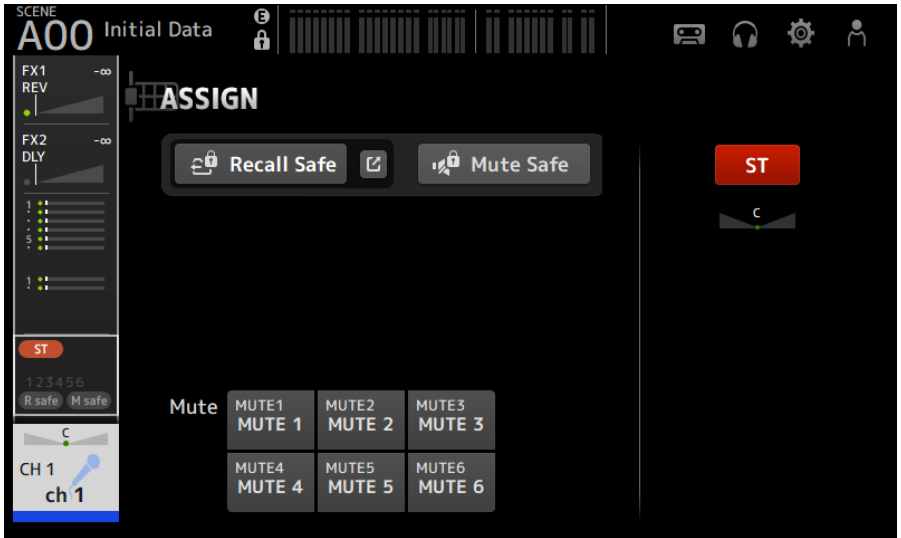

- If the MATRIX BUS is set to stereo, the SEND PAN sliders on channels set to stereo, such as MIX and STEREO channels, become BAL (balance) sliders.
- The MATRIX BUS can be switched between stereo and mono via the BUS SETUP screen on the SETUP screen.

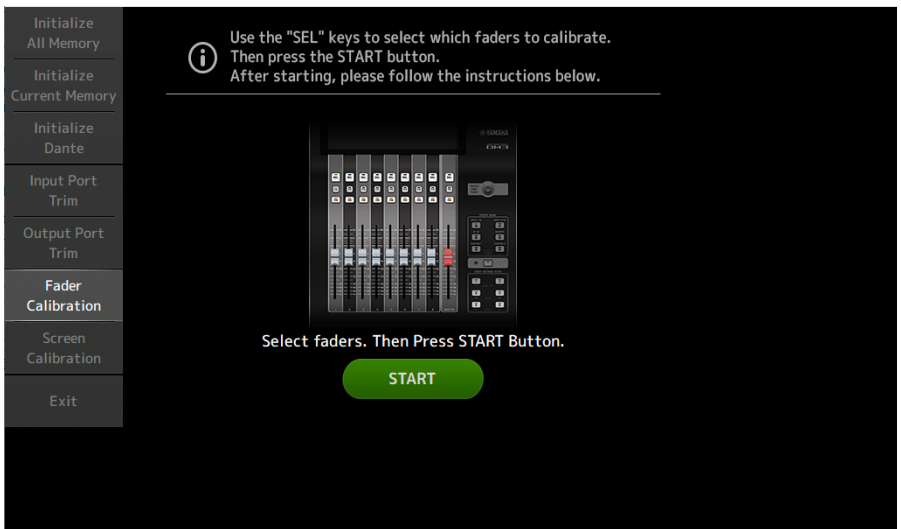
In some usage environments, discrepancies may occur in the movement of motorized faders. The Fader Calibration screen allows you to adjust this discrepancy. Two types of fader calibration functions are available.

Position Calibration	Corrects the fader knob position to match the mixer's internal settings.
Motor Calibration	Automatically optimizes the fader motor movement.

### 1 Turn on the console while holding down the [HOME] key on the top panel.

The MAINTENANCE screen opens.

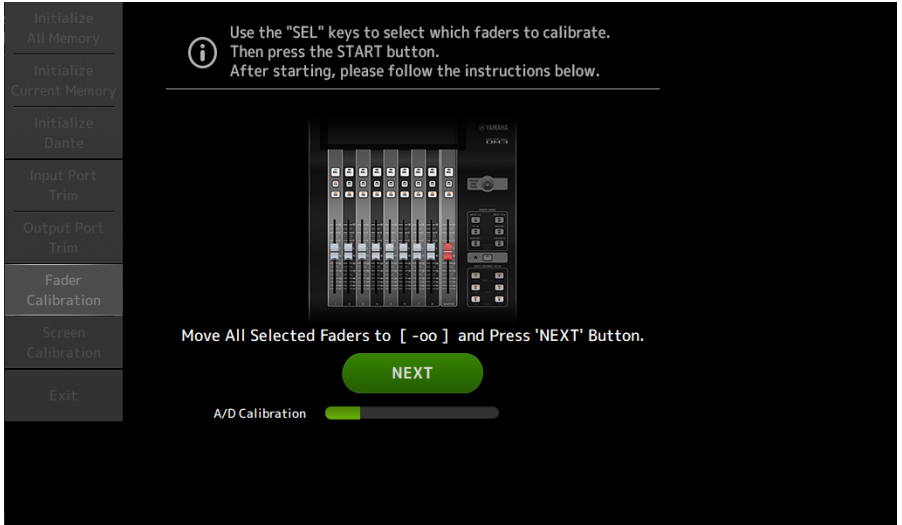

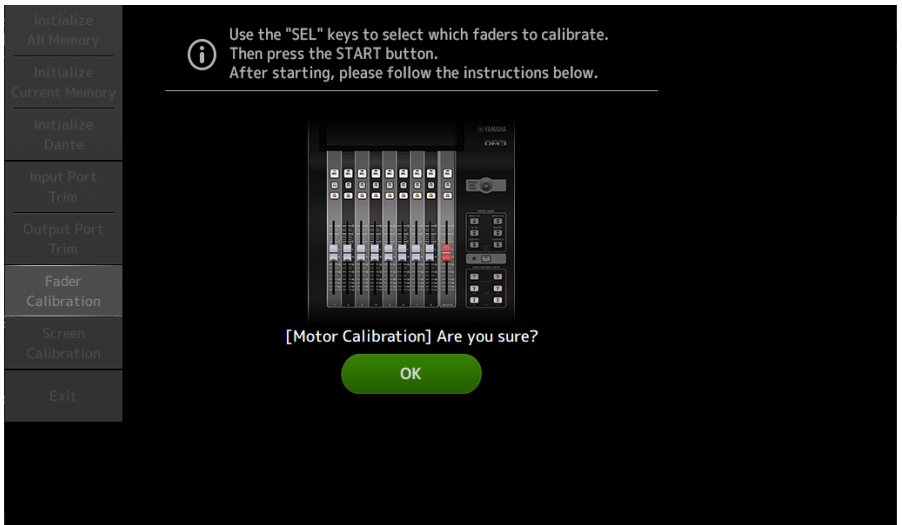

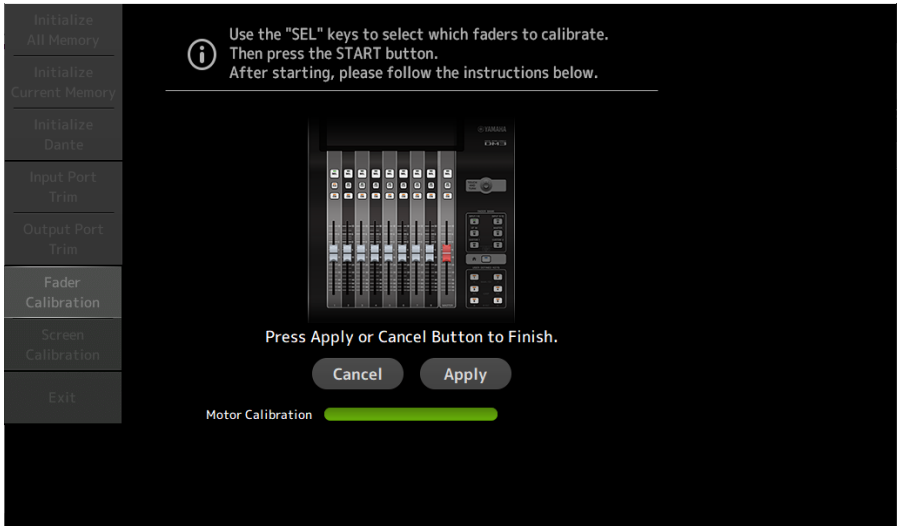

## 8 Touch the Exit button in the maintenance menu and start up the console as usual.

## If a fader must be calibrated again

---

If a fader must be calibrated again, the [ON] or [CUE] key of the corresponding fader will flash.

Follow the steps below to do so.

**1 Use the Close button to close the popup screen “Found faders requiring adjustment. Please calibrate the faders again.” that opens on the screen.**

**2 Press the Apply button on the screen.**

The [SEL] keys of faders requiring recalibration light.

**3 Slide the corresponding fader to the highest and lowest positions several times.**

Make sure the fader's slide action is smooth and not getting stuck.

**4 Perform the procedure described in “Calibrating faders” beginning at step 2.**

If you perform this procedure multiple times and the popup message is still displayed, contact your Yamaha dealer listed at the end of the instruction manual.

## DM3 Editor

DM3 Editor is a computer program that allows you to use your computer to edit DM3 series console settings while away from the console (offline mode), and operate the console using the computer while it is connected to the console (online mode).

DM3 Editor and DM3 series console connect via a network connection. A DM3 series console and DM3 Editor can connect to each other if they are connected to the same network. For information about network settings, refer to the Installation Guide for DM3 Editor.

Many of the DM3 Editor screens are constructed of the same screens as the console, and there is a great deal of affinity in the operation of DM3 Editor and the console.

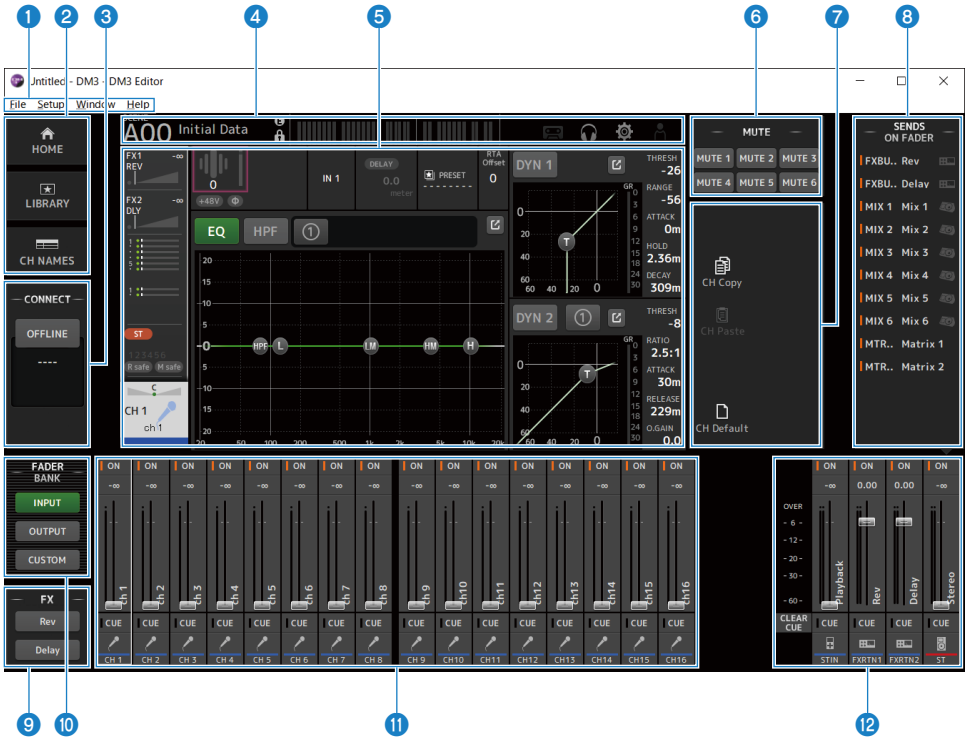
### NOTE

- Only one DM3 Editor can run on a computer at a time.
- Up to 3 DM3 Editor and DM3 StageMix can be used at the one time. However, only one of these can be DM3 Editor.
- Parts of this software use open source software. Please refer to the Legal screen for information on licensing of such software.

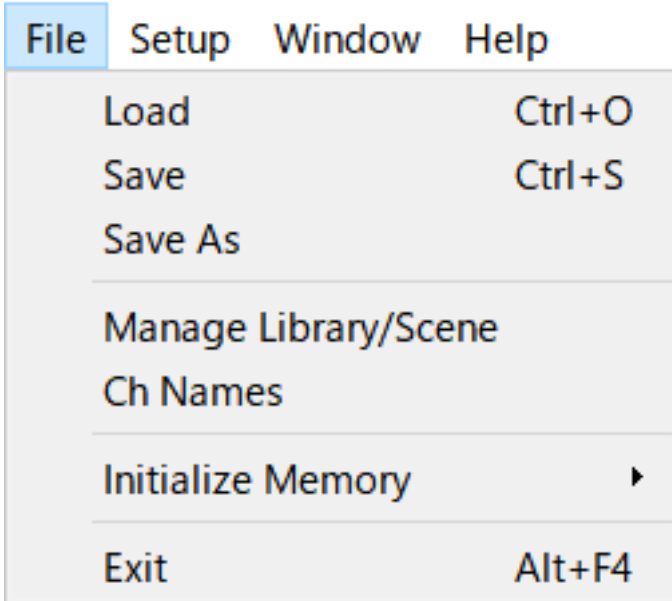

## Menu bar

### File menu

The File menu allows you to work with files.



DM3 Editor supports the following file types.

File extension	Description
.DM3P	Used to store data for one Preset in a single file.
.DM3S	Used to store data for one Scene in a single file.
.DM3F	Used to store all mixer settings.

#### NOTE

- You can save .DM3F files created using DM3 Editor to a USB storage device that is connected to your computer. Later, if you connect the USB storage device to the DM3 Series console's USB connector, you can load the data directly into the console. Similarly, you can use the DM3 Series console to save .DM3F files to a USB storage device, and then connect the device to your computer and load the data into DM3 Editor.
- You can drag and drop .DM3P files within the DM3 Editor screen to save and load them.

Each item in the menu is displayed below.

#### • **Load :**

Allows you to select a saved .DM3F file and load it.



- **Save :**

Saves the current settings by overwriting the existing .DM3F file.

- **Save As :**

Allows you to save the current settings as a newly named .DM3F file.

- **Manage Library/Scene :**

Displays the Manage Library/Scene screen which allows the batch management of library and Scene data within the DM3 Editor.

This feature cannot be used during ONLINE connection with the DM3 Series console.

- **Ch Names :**

Displays the Ch Names screen used for setting up the icon, name and color of the input channel and output channel.

- **Initialize Memory :**

This feature cannot be used during ONLINE connection with the DM3 Series console.

- **Current Memory :**

Initializes the current memory of the DM3 Editor.

The following data is initialized: mixing data and setup data.

- **All Memory :**

Initializes the internal memory of the DM3 Editor.

The following data is initialized: all Scene data, all Preset data, mixing data, and setup data.

- **Exit**

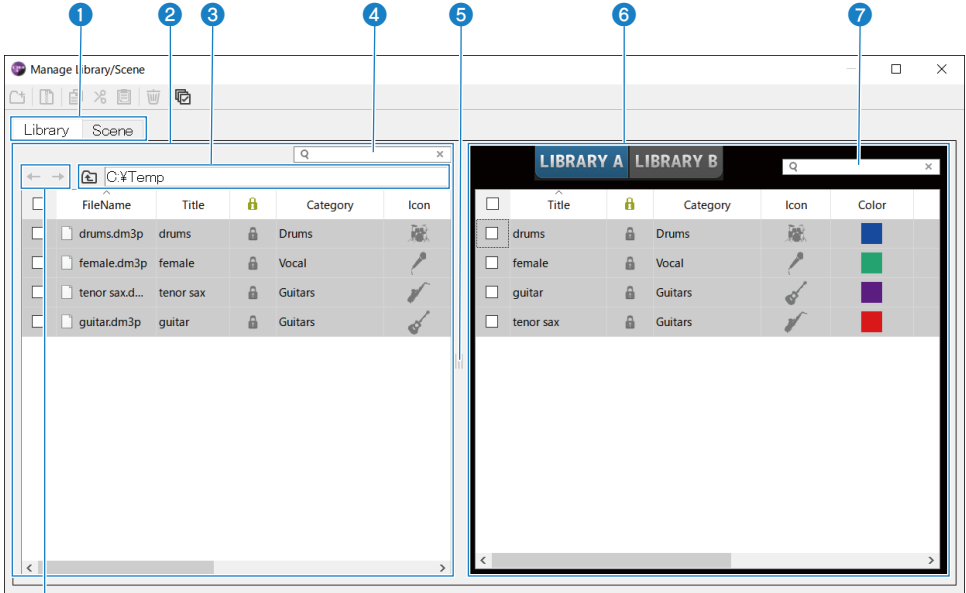
Closes the DM3 Editor.

## Manage Library/Scene screen

The Manage Library/Scene screen is for batch managing the scene and library data in the DM3 Editor.

In addition to editing library and scene data, it can also handle library and scene data saved in .DM3F files as individual files.

When the connection of the DM3 series console is offline, select Manage Library/Scene from the file menu to open it.



### 1 Library tab/Scene tab

Toggles the screen displayed.

### 2 Left pane

Displays the folders and files on the computer, including .DM3P (library data), .DM3S (scene data) and .DM3F files.

More than one line can be selected via their checkboxes and operated at one time. Clicking a file while selected allows editing, either by entering text directly or via pulldown menus.

Displayed files can be moved, such as by dragging or copying them to the right pane (inside the DM3 Editor) or one directory level down.

### 3 Bus display

Displays the directory path of the list displayed in the left pane. A path can also be entered directly.

Click the button on the left side to move up one level.

### 4 Text search box

Allows filtering of the display by searching for text in File Name, Title or Comment.

**5 Separator**

The separator handle can be moved left/right to resize the left/right panes.

**NOTE**

- If you make many, quick operations on the touch panel, you may not be able to use it thereafter. If this happens, operate it once with your mouse or touch pad, or remove the highlighting from the application.
- When many files are displayed in the left pane, it may slow down sorting or selecting them, but this is not a malfunction. Please wait for the program to respond. We recommend keeping the number of files displayed in the left pane to 1,000 or less.
- When the Manage Library/Scene screen is open, do not manipulate files in the folder displayed in the left pane, such as with the Finder or the Explorer on your computer. It may take a long time to refresh the display of the Manage Library/Scene screen.

**6 Right pane**

Displays data in DM3 Editor for each bank.

It works the same way as the left pane.

The Protect item can be switched ON/OFF by clicking it, regardless of what is selected. When ON, editing becomes unavailable.

Presets with Protect ON are displayed grayed out.

**7 Text search box**

Allows filtering of the display by searching for text in Title or Comment.

**8 ←/→ buttons**

Click to move up/down one level.

**■ Toolbar**



Right-clicking opens the same kind of menu.

**1 New Folder**

Creates a new file in the computer directory displayed in the left pane.

**2 Extract ProjectFile**

Extracts a .DM3F file and handles the data inside as individual files. Click to open a dialog for specifying the extract to location. When extraction is executed, it creates a Library folder and a Scene, and extracts to individual files for each bank.

**3 Copy**

Copies the selected data.

**4 Cut**

Cuts the selected data.

**5 Paste**

Pastes the Copy or Cut data.

**6 Delete**

Deletes the selected data.

**7 Select All**

Selects all displayed data.

**NOTE**

- Drag & dropping individual files directly to places like the computer desktop is not available from the Manage Library/Scene screen.
- If you copy/move multiple scene files from your computer, they will be copied in order from the line selected as the copy/move destination. When doing so, if data to be overwritten is protected, the system cannot copy or move lines that are protected.
- If the number of scenes in the copy/move to bank will exceed the maximum (100) as a result of copy/moving them, it will copy/move up to the maximum (100) scenes.
- It will not copy or move if doing so would make the copy/move to banks in a library exceed the maximum (1,000).

The Ch Names screen is for configuring the icons, names and colors of input and output channels.

### 3 **Edit area**

Allows you to set the channel name, icon and color for displayed channels. The parameters displayed vary with the type of channel.

Content that can be edited here is the same as the main window of DM3 Editor. In addition, any content edited while connected to the DM3 series console is synchronized with the console in both directions.

Right click (Windows) or [Ctrl] + click (Mac) inside the Edit area to open the menu.

Parameters that can be edited in the Edit area:

- **Stereo Link :**

Setting and canceling Stereo Link is available from the menu. Right click (Windows) or [Ctrl] + click (Mac) with channel(s) selected to open the menu.

The chain icon is displayed between linked channels.

- **Channel Icon :**

Click to open a menu for selecting the channel icon.

- **Channel Name :**

Click to enable entering text.

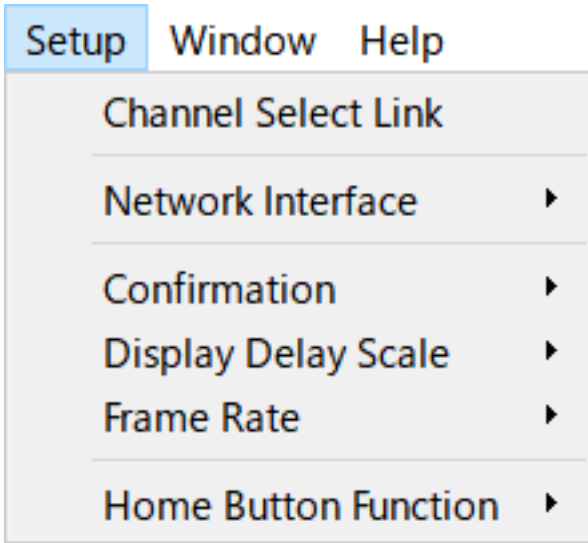
- **Channel Color :**

Click the cell of the desired color to set the channel color.

## Setup menu

---

The Setup menu is for configuring the environment for using DM3 Editor.



When you select an item, it is checked and the function is enabled. Select the item again to remove the checkmark and disable the feature.

- **Channel Select Link :**

When synced with the DM3 series console, this determines whether to sync the channel selection with the console.

- **Network Interface :**

Allows you to select the network port used for communication between your computer and the DM3 series console.

What is displayed here varies the usage environment.

- **Confirmation :**

Determines whether a confirmation dialog is displayed when you use Store, Recall, INPUT Patch or OUTPUT Patch functions.

When checked, the confirmation dialog is enabled.

- **Display Delay Scale :**

The unit of delay displayed in the DELAY box can be set to sample, frame, meter, feet or ms.

- **Frame Rate :**

Selects the frame rate for the delay setting in the frame unit.

- **Home Button Function :**

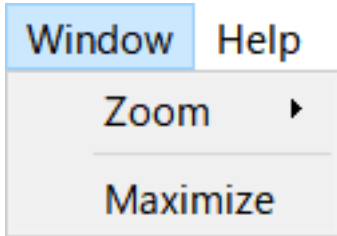
Selects the section to display when the HOME button is clicked. When “CH STRIP & Selected Channel” is selected, each time the HOME button is clicked, the display switches between the CH STRIP section and the Selected Channel section.



## Window menu

---

The Window menu is for configuring how windows are displayed.

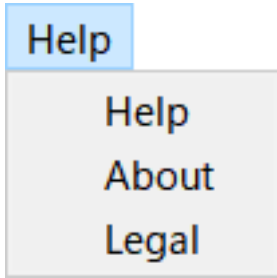


- **Zoom :**  
Changes the size applications are displayed at 100%, 150% or 200%.
- **Maximize :**  
Displays the DM3 Editor at its maximum size.

## Help menu

---

The Help menu displays manual, version and licensing information on the DM3 Editor.



- **Help :**  
Starts your Web browser and displays the manual library.
- **About :**  
Displays the About screen, which shows the version of DM3 Editor.
- **Legal :**  
Displays the DM3 Editor License screen.

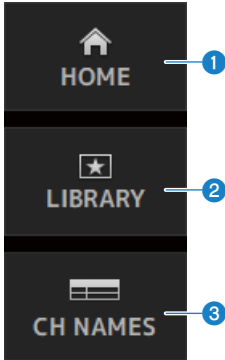
An Internet connection is required to display the manual library.

## Editor area

### HOME/LIBRARY/CH NAMES area

---

The HOME/LIBRARY/CH NAMES area provides shortcut buttons for switching the display of DM3 Editor.



**1 HOME buttons**

Displays the HOME screen in the main display area.

**2 LIBRARY buttons**

Displays the LIBRARY screen in the main display area.

**3 CH NAMES buttons**

Displays the Ch Names screen.

## CONNECT area

---

The CONNECT area is for controlling the connection between DM3 Editor and the DM3 series console.



### Status button

Click this button to switch between ONLINE/OFFLINE.



If DM3 Editor is connected properly with the DM3 series console, this button is displayed. When in this state, the parameters of the DM3 Editor and the DM3 series console are linked.



If DM3 Editor is not connected to the DM3 series console, or if there is a problem with the connection, or if offline editing is selected, this button is displayed.

When in this state, the parameters of the DM3 Editor and the DM3 series console are not linked.

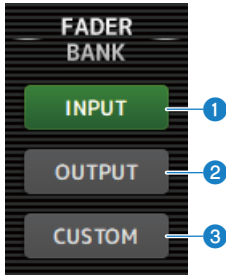
### NOTE

You can choose whether the channel selections are linked or not between DM3 Editor and the DM3 series console. Configure it via Setup Menu → Channel Select Link.

## FADER BANK area

---

The FADER BANK area of the DM3 Editor is for switching the fader banks displayed in the CH STRIP of the DM3 Editor.



**1 INPUT bank**

CH 1-16 are assigned here in the CH STRIP area.

**2 OUTPUT bank**

MIX 1-6, MATRIX 1-2, FX BUS and MONITOR are assigned here in the CH STRIP area.

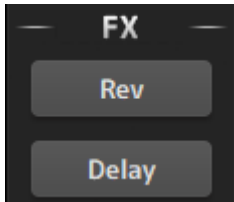
**3 CUSTOM bank**

Custom fader banks are assigned here.

## FX area

---

Touch an FX button in the FX area of DM3 Editor to open the FX screen in the main area.



## MUTE area

---

Use the MUTE area to turn the mute of groups on the DM3 series console ON/OFF.



### Mute group buttons

Mute groups of input channels of the DM3 series console. The buttons light when their mute group is turned ON.

### NOTE

When mute safe is ON for input channels, they are excluded from mute groups.

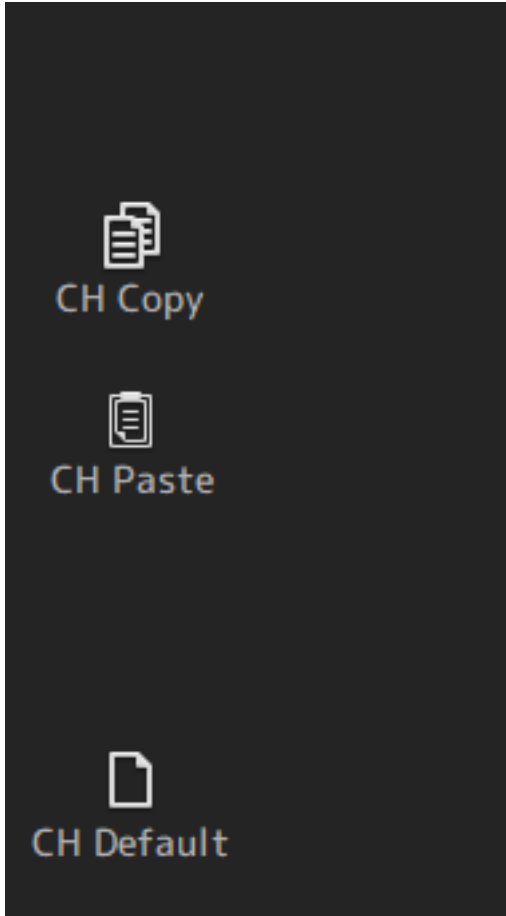
## MENU area

---

The MENU area displays available menus.

It displays a menu of operations that are available for the screen displayed in the main display area.

For information about each menu, refer to the description for that screen.





## SENDS ON FADER area

---

The SENDS ON FADER area is for controlling the CH STRIP area by adjusting send levels and turning sends ON/OFF for specific buses temporarily.

Click a bus to select and highlight it; this puts it in the SENDS ON FADER mode.

Click the selected bus again to cancel the SENDS ON FADER mode.



## CH STRIP area

The CH STRIP area displays a channel strip according to the selections of the FADER BANK of the DM3 Editor.



### 1 ON buttons

Turns the channel ON/OFF. This button lights when the channel is turned ON. In SENDS ON FADER mode, this button controls whether the signal from the channel is sent to the currently selected MIX BUS, MATRIX BUS or FX BUS.

### 2 Fader value

Displays the current fader level value.

Click to select the fader (it turns pink) and then use the mouse wheel to adjust the level. Click again to specify a value using your computer's keyboard. Press the [Enter] key on your keyboard to set the value. If you do not press the [Enter] key, the fader reverts to its previous level when you click another part of the channel strip area or adjust a DM3 series console fader.

### 3 Faders

Faders adjust the signal level of the channel. In SENDS ON FADER mode, faders control the send level from the channel to the currently selected MIX BUS, MATRIX BUS or FX BUS.

Click to select the fader (it turns pink) and then use the mouse wheel to adjust the level.

In SENDS ON FADER, the fader knob changes color to match the channel color of the destination bus.

### 4 CH Display

Displays the channel's ID, color, and icon. Click to select the channel.

### 5 CUE buttons

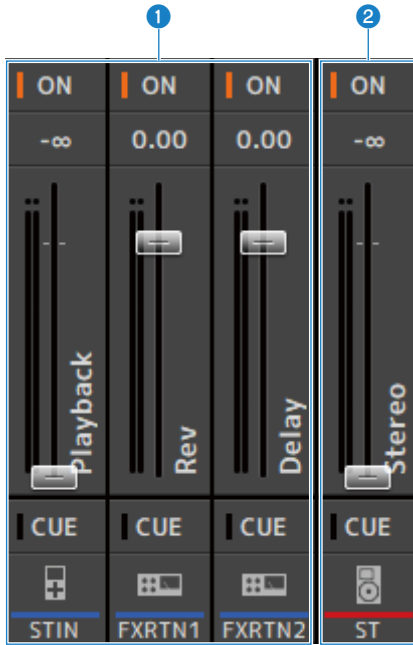
This button selects the channel(s) for CUE monitoring. They light when ON.

### 6 CLEAR CUE buttons

Turns OFF the CUE for all channels.

## MAIN/FX RTN/ST IN STRIP area

The MAIN/FX RTN/ST IN STRIP of DM3 Editor is the area where MAIN/FX RTN/ST IN channel strips are always displayed.



### 1 FX RTN/ST IN STRIP

Controls FX RTN and ST IN channels.

In SENDS ON FADER mode, the fader knob changes color to match the channel color of the destination bus.

### 2 MAIN STRIP

Controls the STEREO BUS.

In SENDS ON FADER mode, send destination channels are displayed as the MAIN strip. In addition, the fader knob changes color to match the channel color of the corresponding bus.

# Using the Editor

## Overview of using the Editor

This explains how to operate DM3 Editor using a mouse and keyboard.

### **Using a mouse wheel**

You can use your computer's mouse wheel just as you would use the console's [TOUCH AND TURN] knob.

### **Using the keyboard of your PC**

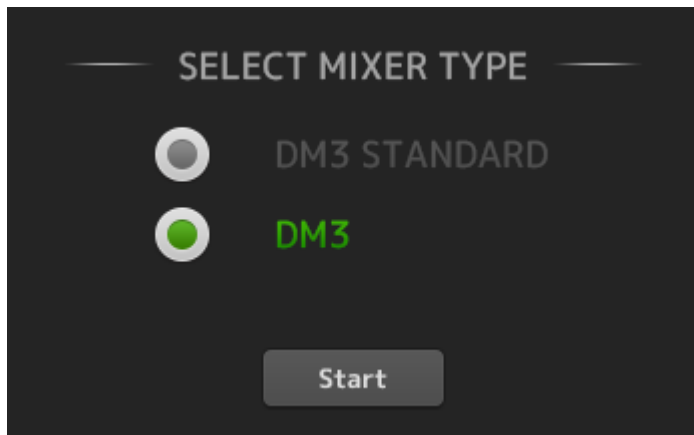
You can use your PC's keyboard just as you would use the console's SOFT KEYBOARD screen.

### **Using a touch screen**

You can use your PC's touchscreen just as you would use the console's touchscreen display.

## Operations at startup of the Editor

When you start DM3 Editor, you will be prompted to select the model of your DM3 series console.



Select the model and click the [Start] button to open the HOME screen.

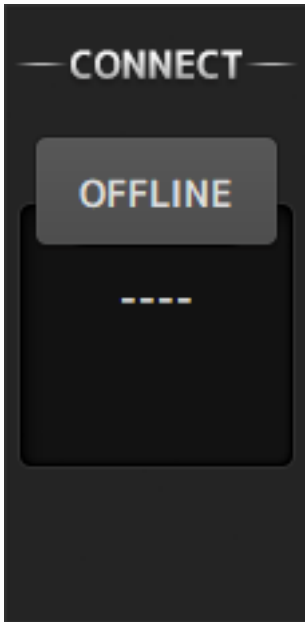
The setting of the selected model is used when the Editor is started subsequently.

## Syncing the Editor and the console

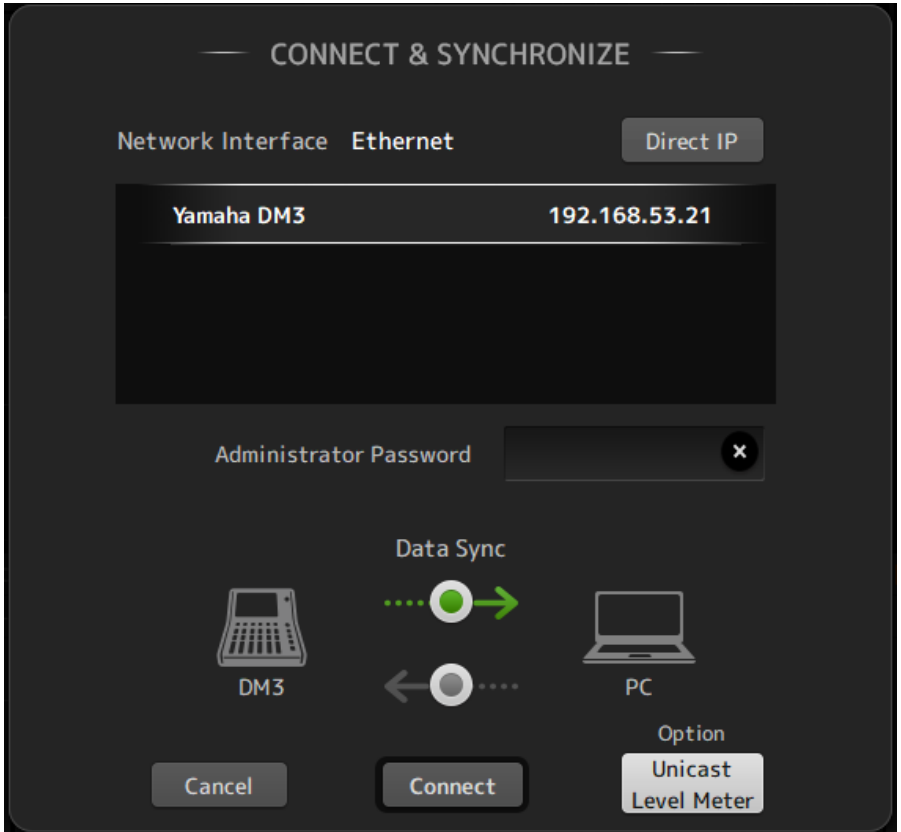
When you start DM3 Editor, its settings will be different from your DM3 console's settings. For that reason, the settings of your DM3 series console and those of DM3 Editor must first be synced.

Before syncing them, you need to configure the network interface.

- 1 Select SETUP → Network Interface.**
- 2 Select the desired network interface from the list of available items.**
- 3 Click OK.**
- 4 Click the status button in the CONNECT area.**



**5** In the **CONNECT** screen, select the **DM3** console and the direction of data syncing.



Only DM3 series consoles of the model you selected when you launched DM3 Editor are displayed.

You can use the DIRECT IP button to directly specify the IP address, instead of using an automatic search. The Unicast Level Meter button allows level meter information to be displayed even if the DM3 is on a different subnet.

If the maximum number (total of 3) of DM3 Editor or DM3 StageMix are already connected to a DM3 Series console, a restricted mark is displayed to the left of its IP Address. Also, even though the DM3 series console selected does not have a restricted mark displayed, when the CONNECT button is pressed, a message indicating connection was not possible may be displayed, due to the connection status of other DM3 Editor and/or DM3 StageMix.

The following sync directions are available.

DM3 → PC    DM3 series console parameter settings are copied to DM3 Editor.

DM3 ← PC    DM3 Editor parameter settings are copied to the DM3 series console.

Using the Editor > Syncing the Editor and the console

- 6 If an Administrator password has been set up for the DM3 series console, enter it.**
- 7 Click the CONNECT button.**

Do not operate the DM3 series console while data is being synced.



## The offline editing function of the Editor

To disconnect the link between the DM3 series console and DM3 Editor and switch to OFFLINE, click the status button in the CONNECT area. When you wish to reflect the editing you made offline to the DM3 series console, click the status button again and select the sync direction DM3 ← PC.

## Comments

### Dante

The DM3 utilizes Dante as the communication protocol for audio signals. Dante is a protocol developed by the company Audinate and it features the ability to handle multiple audio signals with different sampling frequencies, bit rates and device control signals simultaneously in a networking environment that supports Gigabyte Ethernet. It offers the following advantages, among others.

- In theory, it can transmit a total of 1024 channel in a Gigabyte Ethernet environment, with a maximum of 512 inputs and 512 outputs.
- Devices in the network can be detected and configured automatically, while allowing freedom to name devices.
- Low latency, jitter and high sample accuracy are achieved via highly precise, network synchronization technology.
- It supports redundant connections, in the form of primary and secondary lines, making it resistant to failures.
- It allows connections to computers over the Internet and direct IN/OUT of audio without any audio interface device.
- It offers long-distance communications of a maximum of 100 meters between devices over CAT5e network cables. Please note that usable cable length depends on cable type.

### NOTE

- Only the DM3 is capable of using Dante. DM3 STANDARD cannot be used.
- DM3 offers 16 IN, 16 OUT and 24-bit, 32-bit options for transmitting audio signals.
- DM3 also offers 5 options for latency--0.25 msec, 0.5 msec/1.0 msec/2.0 msec and 5.0 msec.

Do not use the EEE function (\*) of a network switch inside a Dante network.

Please do not use the EEE function (\*) of network switches in a Dante network. Although power management should be negotiated automatically in switches that support EEE, some switches do not perform the negotiation properly. This may cause EEE to be enabled in Dante networks when it is not appropriate, resulting in poor synchronization performance and occasional dropouts. Therefore we strongly recommend that:

- If you use managed switches, ensure that they allow EEE to be disabled. Make sure that EEE is disabled on all ports used for real-time Dante traffic.
- If you use unmanaged switches, make sure to not use network switches that support the EEE function, since EEE operation cannot be disabled in these switches.

\*EEE (Energy Efficient Ethernet) is a technology that reduces switch power consumption during periods of low network traffic. It is also known as Green Ethernet and IEEE802.3az.

## The 1-knob EQ mode mechanism

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The 1-knob EQ mode allows you to adjust several parameters at once with just the turn of a knob. It makes EQ adjustments quick and easy. The console contains Presets that are configured for EQ to suit a variety of instruments. You can use the 1-knob EQ mode to adjust the EQ settings that are saved in Presets without disturbing the overall balance of your mix.

You can even configure EQ settings using manual mode, then switch to 1-knob EQ mode (Intensity) to adjust the amount of EQ applied to the channel. In this case you can use the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob to adjust from 0% (no EQ applied) to 50% (the EQ settings you made using manual mode) and 100% (increased intensity of the EQ settings you made using manual mode). This makes it very easy to fine-tune your EQ settings with just one knob.

If 1-knob EQ mode type is set to Vocal or Loudness, you can adjust the EQ curve between 0% (no EQ applied) and 100% (maximum EQ applied).

## **The 1-knob COMP mode mechanism**

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The 1-knob COMP mode allows you to adjust the amount applied to the compressor with just the turn of a knob.

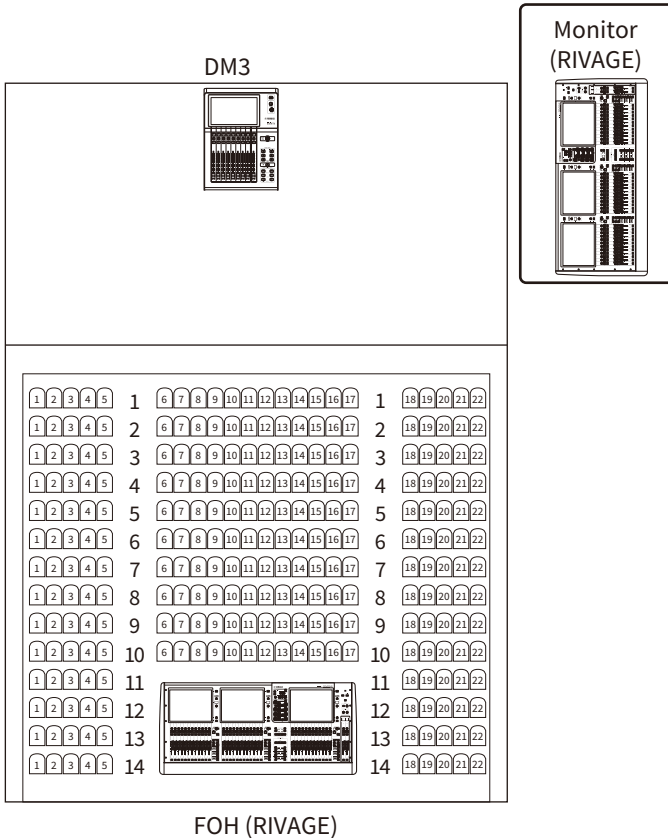
By turning the [TOUCH AND TURN] knob or the 1-knob level slider to the right, more compression is applied. This function can deliver a more consistent sound by evening out differences in volume of components of the sound. For example, it is effective when adjusting the volume just with faders or gain results in clipping.

1-knob COMP takes the worry out of making difficult compressor settings by automatically adjusting the balance of Threshold, Ratio and Out Gain.

## Port to Port function

The Port to Port function allows direct patching between IN/OUT ports. This function allows direct routing between the analog IN/OUT ports of the DM3 series with an external Dante device, without going via a DM3 mixer.

For example, say a drummer wants to adjust monitor balance herself, this allows her to exercise the functions of both a personal monitor mixer and an I/O device, reducing the equipment required. By configuring the DM3 series as a remote I/O device, you can share and remotely control the FOH console and head amp.

Mute is ON.	Check mute group assignments and the settings for mute group control.
A gate is exceeded.	Check the settings on the DYN1 screen.
<b>The volume is low.</b>	
Incorrect gain setting.	Adjust the gain on the INPUT screen.
Noise gate and/or compressor exceeded.	Check the settings on the DYN1 and/or DYN2 screen.
<b>Sound is distorted</b>	
Incorrect gain setting.	Adjust the gain on the INPUT screen.
Input level is too high.	Lower the volume of the input source.
<b>Cannot communicate with PC connected directly to DM3 series</b>	
Subnet mask of DM3 series does not match that of the computer.	Make the IP addresses the same via the Static IP mode. If using the DHCP mode, use a router with a DHCP server function and enable the DHCP function on the computer.
<b>The fader does not work.</b>	
There is a discrepancy in the movement of motorized faders.	Turn on the console while holding down the Home key on the top panel. Then run calibration of the faders from the MAINTENANCE screen.

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This explains the formats that the DM3 series can interpret, send and receive.

### Control change (Bn)

It can transmit arbitrarily assigned parameter.

<<Receive>>

Received when Control Change Rx is ON and Rx Ch matches, and controls parameters according to the settings of the Control Change Event.

<<Send>>

Sent on the channel of Tx Ch when parameters configured with the Control Change Event are operated and Control Change Tx is ON.

Control Change No. 0 and 32 are used for Bank Select in Program Change, so parameters cannot be assigned to them.

## Program change (Cn)

<<Receive>>

When Single is selected and Program change Rx is ON, it is received when Rx Ch matches. However, when Omni is ON, it is received regardless of the channel. When it is received, the scene memory is recalled according to the settings of the Program Change Event.

<<Send>>

When Program change Tx is ON and scene memory is recalled, it is sent according to the settings of the Program Change Event. If Single is selected, it is sent on the Tx Ch channel. If Multi is selected, when the recalled scene memory is allocated to more than one Program Change No., the smallest Program Change No. is sent for each MIDI Ch.

Either Single or Multi can be selected when setting Mode.

### If **Single**

Rx Ch and Omni Ch or Tx Ch can be selected. When Bank is turned ON, you can specify the Bank in Bank Select. Up to 16 Banks can be set.

### If **Multi**

Rx Ch and Tx Ch become the same. An assignment table is configured for each MIDI Ch. Bank Select cannot be used. Up to 16 MIDI Chs can be set.
